A CLEAN SLATE was expected by Stan Irish of the Clarenceville Board of Education when the old Central School on Eight Mile Road got an extensive remodeling job to make way for the re-location of the Board of Education offices. It was discovered behind one of the blackboards were many of the figures of the 1925-26 fiscal year budget for the school district; still legible, and by comparison representing quite a contrast to the present day financial requirements.

Uncover Slate With 43-Yr. Old Clarenceville School Budget

Re-modeling at the old Central School on Eight Mile Road, which will soon be occupied by the Clarenceville Board of Education offices, uncovered budget figures from the 1925-26 school year which has been written on a blackboard and apparently covered with the purpose of preserving a record for posterity. When the top blackboard was removed, revealing the old budget figures during the remodeling, an itemized account of anticipated expenditures for the Clarenceville school system for their 1925-26 fiscal year provided some striking facts for comparison.

Compared with the current school district valuation of \$23,871,699, the old figure of \$2,046,455 represents an increase over the last 43 years of almost 1,200 percent.

Transportation was not even an item of the 1925-26 school budget and school teachers' salaries were listed at just \$24,383.

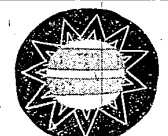
Wednesday, May 22nd is a big day for Donna Ratlof of Lamar. It's her long awaited 15th birthday. Happy birthday, Donna!

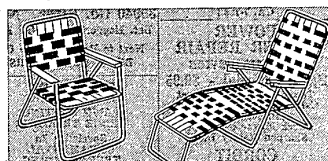

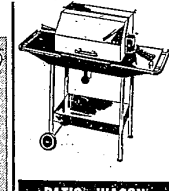

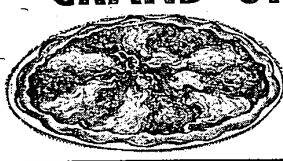
