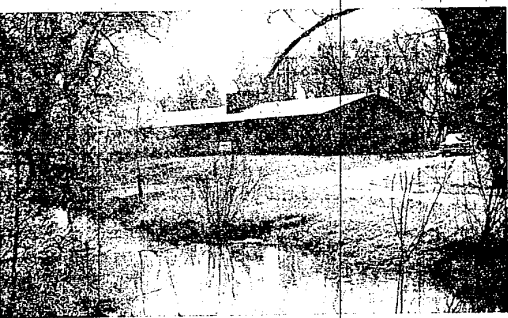

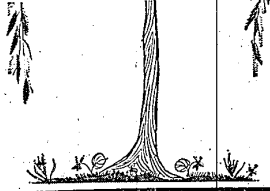

Uncleanliness Is Criticized

Uncleanly conditions about the streets and in the parking lots in the city as well as the unsightly condition of some of the trash barrels in the city and particularly those at the Farmington Plaza came in for some sharp criticism at the City Council meeting Monday night. Councilman Hugo Peterson stated that he felt greater efforts should be made to prevent the fastening of handbills in the city and to get such papers and other items thrown on the street picked up faster. The city presently has an ordinance on its books prohibiting the distribution of handbills either door-to-door or by fastening them on cars.

The criticism on the appearance of the trash barrels was made by Councilman Henry Forrest. He asked the city manager to have the department public works pick them up and repair and paint them as soon as possible.

Township Board Proceedings

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was called to order in the Township Administration Building on May 13th, 1963, at 8:02 p.m. by Mr. Carl Hall, Chairman. Members present were Hall, Cairns, Avery, Jaye, Bassette and Walter; Duke absent. Also present was Mr. Joseph T. Brennan, Township Attorney.

With no corrections the Minutes for the last Regular Meeting April 15th and Special Meeting May 4th stand approved as published.

Mr. Cairns read letter from Atty. Paul Fregolle in re hearing on Application for Class C Liquor License of Mr. Taylor - set for next meeting.

MOTION by Jaye, supported by Bassette, to adopt Article IX A-28, Expressway Service Districts, by amending the Zoning Ordinance as recommended by Zoning Board.

Roll Call Vote, 6 Yeas, 0 Nays, carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Bassette, supported by Jaye, that we amend the Township Zoning Ordinance rezoning from L-1 and R-4 district to B-3 General Business property in Sec. 26, W1/2 of SE1/4 of approximately 20 acres more or less lying south of the centerline of Shawwassee Road, excepting therefrom the north-easterly 183 feet thereof (as measured at right angles to the center line of Shawwassee); also excepting a strip of property 173 feet in width contiguous with the center line of Truck Road and lying north-easterly of a point 210 feet north of the centerline of Nine Mile Road, as indicated and recommended by Zoning Board.

Roll Call Vote - 6 yeas, 0 Nays, carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Walters, supported by Cairns, that the Township Board establish a drainage district for Franklin Knolls Subdivision by petitioning the Oakland County Drain Commission for the same area with the understanding and that Board can withdraw at any time, also that any cost incurred therewith be paid by Franklin Knolls Association.

Roll Call Vote - 6 Yeas, 0 Nays, carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Jaye, supported by Cairns, that we authorize payment of Vouchers Nos. 12871 through 12957 inclusive, and 12958 through 12965 inclusive, from the appropriate funds. Carried, unanimous.

ON MOTION made, supported and carried the Meeting was adjourned at 10:25 p.m.

Further discussion will be held tonight, Thursday, May 23, before the Township Zoning Board on proposed changes in the ordinance governing agricultural uses of property, the sale of produce raised and the keeping of horses and other farm animals.

At a public hearing held a month ago on the changes proposed a number of citizens appeared to object and raise numerous questions on the changes proposed.

Even though the proposed changes can not be made retroactive and thus would not affect any uses or operations presently being conducted, many citizens have still expressed opposition to the proposed amendments. They claim that it deprives individuals of reasonable use of their property.

A large number of citizens are again expected to be attending at the zoning board meeting.

For more than 40 years red poppies have been worn proudly by many Americans around Memorial Day.
