Farmington Seaman Aboard Destroyer

Gilbert J. Murphy, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert J. Murphy, Sr., of 20815 Cass, Farmington, ended a visit in Melbourne, Australia recently aboard the destroyer USS Buchanan.

The visit coincided with the annual celebration of the Battle of the Coral Sea which is regarded as the point during World War II when the Japanese advance on Australia was halted. Upon leaving Australia the Buchanan will return to duty with the Seventh Fleet in the waters of the Far East. She provides anti-aircraft and anti-submarine warfare protection for Pacific Fleet task forces in the Western Pacific. She carries the Tanager guided missiles for aerial defense and the ASROC rockets for destroying submarines.

In addition, she carries 5-inch guns for supporting amphibious operations and for short-range anti-aircraft defense.

Schools Plan June 6 Show Of Art Wares

The Industrial Arts and Art Exhibit will be held in the Farmington Center on June 6, 7 and 8. On Thursday, June 6, it will be open from 12 p.m. to 9 p.m. and the following Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

The North Farmington contingent of the exhibit will be housed in the old Dancer's store, immediately across from the Farmington Center on Grand River near Farmington Road.

Mr. Earl Baumunk, F.H.S. Industrial Arts instructor, explained the exhibit as an attempt to develop a working operation between F.H.S. and N.F.H.S., even though the two schools will be working separately. He further commented, "We want to cooperate; we don't want to compete - even though ours will be better!"

A somewhat ulterior motive for having the exhibit from the industrial arts angle is to sound out adults interested in an adult education course beginning next fall. Mr. Baumunk feels that the exhibit should provide an excellent opportunity for adults to inspect the work and perhaps voice opinion on what, specifically, would interest them if included in a night class. The tentative schedule is for a 3-hour class to be held one night a week. A minimum of 14 people would be required if the class were to become a reality.

In the nature of publicity, the art and industrial departments plan to family celebration honor the birthday of Stanley Chavey, Sr. to parents of students enrolled in art and wood-working classes inviting them to the exhibit. Also, as students, parents in fact everyone - is strongly urged to visit the showing.

Cville Senior Awarded Grant

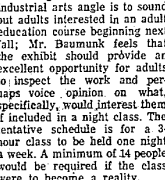

Music Festival Set For Piano Students

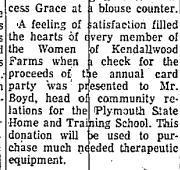

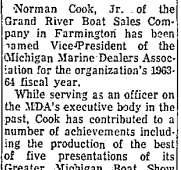

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YWCA Announces Program Of Activities for Summer

Northwest YWCA is announcing its summer program for children, teenagers, and adults which will begin the week of June 18. Part of the program will be held at the Branch, 2590 Grand River, and part will be in other locations.

Swimming classes for girls and boys, adult women, and mother-boys, will be held at the Edison Pool in Greenfield Village on Tuesday and Thursday mornings starting June 26. Instruction for beginners, intermediates, and swimmers will be given. Participants will meet twice a week, thus receiving eight lessons in the four-week period. A second term of instruction will begin July 25 and continue thru August 15. Registration may be made for either period starting June 3 at the Branch building.

Penmanship classes will be held at the Claude Allison Park, Beech Road and Curtis, on Monday and Wednesday mornings for girls and boys 12 years up, and on Tuesday and Thursday mornings for adults. This will be a four week term starting June 24 and ending July 17.

At the Branch building, girls 7-12 years may enroll in a Pony-Tailer's program which will run three mornings per week, Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, starting June 24. The girls will have fun time, games, crafts, and creative dancing. They bring a sack lunch each day, and will use the outdoor facilities near the building. On Fridays they will enjoy trips to Bobo-Loo, the Zoo and other points of interest.

Teen age girls may enroll in a chaperne school to be held Monday and Wednesday afternoons from 1-4 p.m. at the Branch. A skilled professional model will give tips on grooming, hair styling, fashion modeling, clothes and accessories. Other features will include: cooking and entertaining your crowd successfully, drawing and sketching, and informal time for archery and ping-pong.

The program will run for four weeks from June 24 to July 19. Pre-registration is necessary.

A Ladies Morning Out will be held on Tuesday from 9:30 until 12 noon, starting June 18 for a five week term. The women will have a choice of drawing and sketching, knitting and sewing, and intermediate or duplicate bridge. Nursery care for children 3-6 years of age will also be available.

On Tuesday evenings adult men and women may enroll for oil painting, or dance instruction. Mrs. Ruth Jones will teach the oil painting class which will run for five weeks. Mr. Don May will instruct the dance which will include the Mambo and the Bass Nova in the patio of the building.

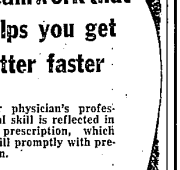
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
