# Two Young Farmington Scientists Honored

Two Farmington boys won honors in the Michigan Heart Association special judging of exhibits at the 1963 Science Fair. They are Louis J. Lavigne, Jr., 15, 3409 Schulte Drive, who won a cash first prize, and Douglas E. Lam, 12, 2810 Westbrook, who won a certificate of merit.

Dr. Sidney E. Chapin, president of the Michigan Heart Association, a Torch Drive agency made presentations to a total of 13 Detroit area students at luncheon, Saturday, May 11, at the J.L. Hudson Co. department store. Judges were Dr. Chapin and Dr. John G. Bickelstein, medical director of the Association, who determined winners on the basis of excellence in the special field of information about, research on, or medical problems affecting the heart and circulation of blood.

**THE LAVIGNE BOY**, a ninth grade student at Our Lady of Sorrows High School is a son of the president of the Metropolitan National Bank of Farmington.

Young Lam, a seventh grade student at the O.E. Dunkel Junior High School, is the son of Dr. Conrad Lam, chief thoracic surgeon at Henry Ford Hospital.

The Lavigne boy's project, whose "purpose was to construct a functional ergograph to determine how cerebral control involved circulation, trained muscles, and affected muscle strength," involved the use of a variable blood pressure gauge, a pulling mechanism, and a turn of graph paper. His science teacher is Sister Mary Michael. The title was "Factors That Affect Muscle Strength."

"I had subjects pull with a finger and took the blood pressure of the arm," young Lavigne told the assembled Michigan Heart Association group. "I learned some interesting things. Trained muscles, boys' muscles usually, have a great deal more strength than untrained muscles, girls' muscles. Generally, however, untrained muscles respond a great deal more to outside stimulation, urging to try harder or flatter, than to trained muscles."

Young Lam's project was a model of the heart-lung pump, detailing some principles of flow of blood, and of the circulation of blood.

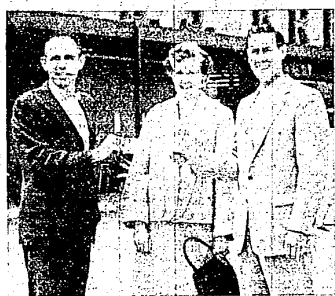

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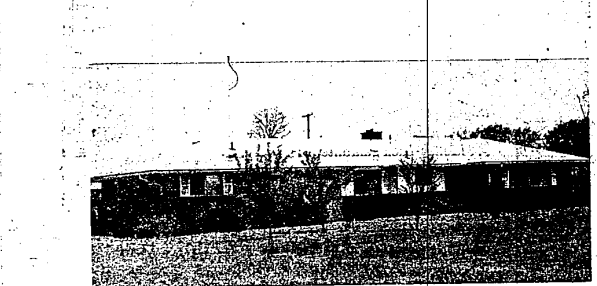

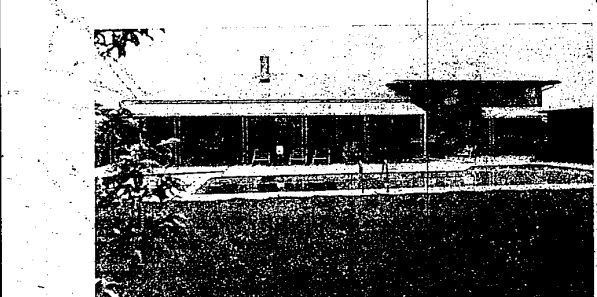
