are not involved in the cutting up of the 15 mills. City taxes are entirely separate. The city levy this year will be \$11.50 per \$1,000 assessed and not equalized valuation. There is very little difference in these two figures, however, since the city assesses pretty close to what the state expects communities should.  
The city's equalized valuation is \$24,892,229 which is only a little over \$2 million higher than the assessed valuation of \$22,637,720.  
Final action on the preliminary equalized valuation figures and amount of levies to be allowed for each of the governing bodies is expected to be taken at a meeting of the County Tax Allocation Board on Monday, June 3.  
What it is state equalized valuation figures upon which rates are actually applied and thus none of the figuring can be considered final, officials are confident that the state equalization board will accept the county equalization figures as they stand.

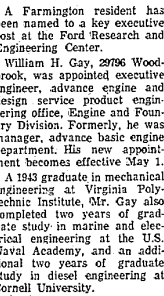

**Bd. Approves Earth Moving Plans in Twp.**

The Farmington Township Board took action at its regular meeting Monday evening, May 27, renewing the permit for sand removal in Echo Hills Subdivision.  
The one-year extension will allow the land developers to proceed with operations to remove what the County Road Commission considers excessive sand, preparatory to building roads there.  
The PLANNED subdivision is bordered by 13 Mile, Haggerty and Drake roads and has been the scene of sand excavation over the past three years.  
Action was also taken by the Board to permit an earthmoving operation on Eight Mile Road paving project site between Farmington Road and Haggerty. The Board approved a request for Steven Corporation, subject to approval from the Township Zoning Board of Appeals, to excavate some 40,000 cubic feet of sand from a knoll on the property owned by the Glen Eden Cemetery.

possible "downgrading effect" such a business could take on regardless of the original intent of the owners and developers. There is no assurance, he pointed out, that once the business changes hands that previous standards would be maintained.
