Farmington School Board Candidates

There are four candidates running in the June 10 School Election for one available seat on the Farmington School District Board of Education. Voting for the four-year term position will be incumbent, Mrs. Barbara Ann Brown, and three newcomers, William E. Jackson, Jr., George L. Rickey and Charles H. Williams.

Biographical information on each candidate and their answers to two questions posed by the Enterprise follows:

The two questions were:

- 1) State your feelings regarding extension of the school year (perhaps to an 11-month program) to provide greater utilization of school facilities.
- 2) If finances did not permit continuance of the present school program at some future date, what subjects or special programs would you recommend eliminating? Indicate at least three in order of preference.

Mrs. B. A. Brown

Mrs. Barbara Ann Brown, 51, lives with her attorney husband, Wendell, at 29291 Ardmore Street in Farmington. They have two children, aged 17 and 20, and have been residents of the School District for the past 22 years, formerly residing in Detroit.

Her educational background includes graduation of Somerset High School in Pennsylvania and

an A. B. degree from the University of Michigan. She also attended the University of Pittsburgh. Mrs. Brown has been a homemaker very active in civic affairs and has served the last four years on the Farmington School District Board of Education, presently serving as the secretary of the Board.

She is affiliated with the American Association of University Women (Farmington Branch), has served as the AAUW president and as the state chairman of the Status of Women Committee; The Farmington Friends of the Library; Girl Scouts of America, holding the offices of District chairman, second vice-president and secretary of the Southern Oakland County District.

Here are her replies to the two questions posed by the Enterprise:

- 1) "Greater utilization of school facilities is much to be desired. As for the 11-month program, we already have a very successful self-supporting summer session, which makes for a partial 11-month program. "Our success with summer

W. E. Jackson, Jr.



William E. Jackson, Jr. lives with his wife, Mary Joyce, and their five children, aged 12, 9, 8, 4 and 12 months, at 5286 Woodmark in Farmington. He is 39 years old.

A resident of the Farmington School District for the past three years, Jackson is employed as an elementary school principal in the Clarenceville School District, a post he has held for three years. His last previous residence was Raleigh, Indiana.

His educational background includes a B. S. degree in education with a major in curriculum and an M. S. degree in education with a major in administration.

Jackson is a member of the following organizations: C.E.A., M.E.A.; N.E.A. (life member); is chairman of the M.E.A. Institute on D.S.; and also a member of the Michigan Historical Society, and school activities Council.

Here are Jackson's replies to the Enterprise questions:

- 1) "I have three reasons for being in favor of the 12-month school program. Basically, the extra weeks would make it possible to increase the knowledge of our young citizens. Secondly, the tax dollars would go farther by using the facilities year around. Finally, staff members would have an opportunity for summer employment at their profession instead of some menial work."

- 2) "I believe that each subject offers opportunities to enrich the background of the students. However, since some subjects are necessary to meet the challenges of life, these must be considered the most important."

"The elective areas offer broadening experiences for only a minority of students. Therefore, if I had to suggest areas to be dropped, I would suggest the following elective areas: track; advanced art; and instrumental music."

George L. Rickey



George L. Rickey, 38, lives with his wife, Faith E. Rickey, and their three children, a daughter, 16, and two sons, aged 13 and 9 at 21985 Leyte Road in Farmington. He has been a resident of the School District for the past three years, moving here from Lansing, Michigan where he resided for five years.

Rickey's educational background includes graduation from Flint Central High School in 1942; a B. A. degree from Michigan State University (1955), business administration, majoring in personnel.

He is employed as a personnel assistant for the All-State Insurance Company at 4020 Northland Drive where he has worked for the past seven years. He is a member of the Detroit Association of Associated Farmington Township Auxiliary Police Department; Forest Park Homeowners Association, serving as vice president in 1959 and chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee in 1962. He lists no previous governmental experience.

difficulties will never result in day in the Farmington system definitely needed. Any parent who has gone through the rigors of scheduling a High School program for their children is well aware of this.

"Utilization of the school facilities can be accomplished with recognition of the fact that school buildings are public buildings, supported by public funds, and should be available for public use and functions."

- 2) "My opinion of the present program based on the limited knowledge made public would indicate that we have very few, if any, programs that could be dropped. I do not feel that the special programs are sufficient to be publicly known. It is my impression that our present school program is pretty much basic. This is one of my concerns. "The school system has a two-fold purpose: (1) To prepare those students who can continue on to higher education and (2) To prepare these students who financially, or for other reasons, cannot continue on with education, with a set of values and communication skills so they may be useful, progressive members of the community. The program should be geared to meet these two-fold purposes."

Chas. H. Williams



Charles H. Williams, 28, lives with his wife, Patricia, and their two children, aged 4 and 5 1/2 (in kindergarten), at 22001 Tredwell in Farmington Township. He has been a resident of the School District for the past three years. His last previous residence was at the U.S. Air

Force Base in Austin, Texas, where he served for four years. Williams' educational background includes graduation from Northwestern High School in 1951; attended Wayne State University from 1951 through 1953; the University of Texas (1955-59) receiving a B. A. degree in business administration; the University of Detroit (1959-61) earning a Masters degree in business administration.

He is employed as a Certified Public Accountant with the firm of Ernst and Ernst where he has worked the past four years. Williams is a member of the Forest Park Homeowners Association, serving as its treasurer in 1961-62 and its president this year; member of the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants; American Institute of CPAs; and the Greater Detroit Retail Contractors Group. He is also a member of the William Grace PTA.

Here are Williams' replies to the Enterprise questions:

- 1) "School facilities are not now being utilized to the greatest extent possible. It seems a shame to spend millions of dollars on facilities that are being utilized only 15 percent of the time."

"However, there is the human element involved. The warm months of summer are not conducive to study; family vacations must be planned; and extensions of teaching hours must become accepted by the educators."

"As a School Board member, I would not advocate extension of the school year unless the electorate could not meet their obligations in providing sufficient funds for the school system."

- 2) "Elimination of existing programs can only be recommended after careful analysis of various facets affecting the program, and specifically a study of the cost versus the value received. Our school system is not in the best financial condition and with this in mind, I offer my services and financial background as a candidate for the Board. If elected, I shall be particularly interested in financial conditions, budgeted revenue and expense, and cost justification in working on the Board to solve the financial dilemma. Without this review, I am unable to indicate specific programs to eliminate in case of financial crises."
