Council Acts In Wood Creek Landfill Case

The Village of Wood Creek Farms Council revealed Tuesday night, June 4, at their regular meeting that no location has been sent out to the bonding company of Sandhill, Inc. has not lived up to its word to have a contract for landfill operation completed to the satisfaction of the Council.

Jack Johnson, the contractor leaving the landfill operation, said that the landfill at Wellington Drive and Northwestern, met with Council members last week and indicated he would start on grading work, seeding and leveling this week.

THE CORNER LOTS, originally a land sale were the scene last year of dumping and creating operations which has in increasing measure the concern of abutting property owners in the area.

The Village Council had stipulated in their agreement with the contractor that work should be completed a year ago. Concerning the bonding company, which is liable under the agreement, was done in an effort to protect the Village from a possible claim on the part of the contractor who this week made the first visible attempt to complete the work by hauling in several truck loads of top soil.

In restricting parking in front of the stores to allow the flow in and out into three lanes at this point. Also brought out the fact that many small businesses in this area had no additional area to provide for off-street parking and that a "no parking" ban would hurt them badly and perhaps even force them to close.

Bob Harris, owner of the Homestead House a short distance to the east, pointed out that the Highway Department already owns an additional 17 feet of right-of-way along the route between Hawthorne and Violet streets for parking other than parking being allowed in front of the stores.

Earl Lavery, insurance man moving a building between Hawthorne and Nine Mile, stated that he felt accidents being experienced in that area were the result of parking other than parking being allowed in front of the stores.

PEOPLE MAKING left turns on Nine Mile into the S. & W. Drive-in at Hawthorne are the cause of most of the accidents, he stated. Traffic is moving too fast at the point where the left turns are not judging this speed well enough, he commented. He suggested that "reduced speed" signs should be posted and a speed limit be cut down for westbound traffic prior to its reaching the city limits.

Lavery also stated that better lighting was put in on Grand River in the city some years ago but only as far as Violet, he pointed out. Promises to extend it eastward to the city limits were never fulfilled, he stated.

The Council instructed the city manager to notify the highway department of its action. They asked further that he investigate to see what could be done to get better lighting in this area and the highway made better at the eastern boundary of the city and sign signs erected to reduce traffic speed as it enters the city.

Trailers Must Stay to Rear

The City Council took action Monday night adopting a regulation that will require all house trailers in residential neighborhoods to be kept in back yards and behind the rear house line in the future.

The originally proposed ordinance which would have prohibited house trailers from being kept in residential neighborhoods altogether met with some strong objections by a small group of local citizens. A check made by the city manager, of a number of nearby communities revealed that only one had any regulations on the keeping of trailers in residential zones sections of their communities.

The manager's proposal was that the ordinance be written to allow trailers at the sides of homes as long as they did not stick out in front of the front building line but councilmen amended it to require that they be at the rear of homes instead.

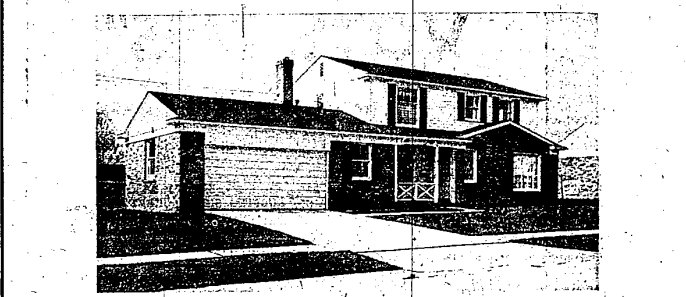
