Timely Tips on GARDENING

FRINGE TREE - A rare and beautiful tree that is found growing in only a few gardens in this area is the white fringe tree, Chionanthes. At this season the spreading branches are covered with foamy masses of bloom. A closer inspection reveals innumerable small blossoms with long twisted petals like narrow ribbons gathered into a miniature tassel. The foliage is most attractive, too. The texture and form of the leaves is similar to the magnolia, but about half the size.

The botanical name, Chionanthes, comes from the Greek words "chion" meaning snow and "anthos" flower. It is a close relative of the lilac and privet. C. virginica is a native of the eastern United States and grows wild from Texas north into Pennsylvania. Another variety is C. retusa that is a native of China and Japan.

In its native habitat the fringe tree develops many stalks and trunks and tends to be a spreading shrub. In the garden it can be grown either as a shrub or as a small tree. To develop the tree form lower branches must be pruned off as the trunk grows and develops. Little pruning is needed if it is grown as a bush. They grow from ten to thirty feet tall.

They thrive best in rich loamy soil in full sun, but will do reasonably well in a shaded location.

Ample moisture is needed. They are fibrous rooted so arcing in only a few gardens in this area is the white fringe tree, Chionanthes. At this season the spreading branches are covered with foamy masses of bloom. A closer inspection reveals innumerable small blossoms with long twisted petals like narrow ribbons gathered into a miniature tassel. The foliage is most attractive, too. The texture and form of the leaves is similar to the magnolia, but about half the size.

It is still too late to plant vegetables or annuals, but finish this task as soon as possible. As annuals and vegetables sprout and the seedlings become an inch or more in height thin them so the remaining plants will have enough room to develop. Replant rows of radishes and other early crops as they are harvested. Make repeat plantings of shirley poppies, annual phlox and other annuals that come into bloom quickly but last only a few weeks. Apply a quick acting liquid fertilizer will give newly planted annuals and vegetables a boost and help them become established more quickly. Keep faded flowers removed from annuals to keep them blooming. Cut back delphinium, columbine, canterbury bells after they have flowered to stimulate a second period of bloom. Rose chiggers, ants, beetles and black spot have all made their appearance in the rose garden and control measures are needed. Many gardeners have found a mixture of Isotox, Faltan, and a bit of detergent to be an effective all-purpose spray for roses and other flowers, too. Since the controversy still rages over the detrimental effects of insecticides use them only when the "bugs" are in evidence and only where needed.

Michigan Bell Supply Unit's Report Filed

Western Electric Company, the manufacturing and supply unit of the Bell System, reported today it spent almost \$8,000 a day in Michigan for supplies, services and gross payrolls in 1962.

These expenditures were in addition to those made by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company throughout the state.

TOTAL PAYMENTS to Michigan suppliers for raw materials, telephone company supplies, government subcontractors and transportation services amounted to more than \$2.9 million.

This total went to 1,330 suppliers in 149 Michigan towns. About 87.7 percent of the firms were small businesses employing less than 500 people each.
