Deputy Newman also gave a timely message covering the field of water safety. The students were impressed with the dangers of using inflated tubes and toys as "life preservers."

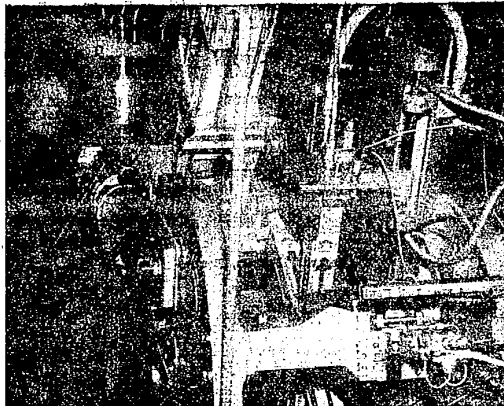

Coast Guard To Accelerate St. Recruiting

The Coast Guard Recruiting officer for the state of Michigan announced today that the Coast Guard has accelerated their recruiting program for regular enlistments.

Due to the large volume of men retiring after completing twenty years service since the beginning of World War II and the steady increase of ship plants, and stations, personnel are needed to fill these positions. THE COAST GUARD is the smallest branch of the armed forces and the most selective of all services.

Regular enlistments are available for young men between the ages of 17 and 26 years and to age 35 for ex-servicemen.

Enlistees fly to Cape May, New Jersey for their initial 12 weeks recruit training, after which they may receive 10 days "Bont" leave and are then assigned to a Coast Guard ship, station, or shore duty. Advanced technical training, "Buddies" who enlist together are sworn in and remain to undergo thorough recruit training.
