A short program will take place at about 3:30 p.m. at which time Secretary of State James M. Hall and perhaps other dignitaries will make very brief remarks.

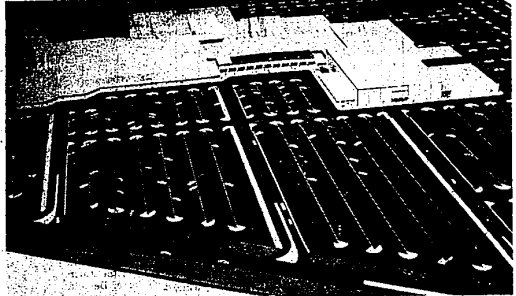
Joe Davis, Safety Supervisor for the Road Commission is General Chairman for the celebration and will be assisted by the Board of Road Commissioners who will act as hosts.

THIS IS A SCALE MODEL of the planned \$25,000,000 regional shopping center at Seven Mile and Middlebelt Road which ground was broken for last week. The ground breaking for this center was simultaneous with another exactly the same planned in Roseville, Michigan. Each center, covering 60 acres with parking for approximately 5,000 cars, will have as its major stores in the center Sears, Roebuck and Co. and Crowley, Miller and Company stores. Sixty stores and services are called for in each center.

Break Ground For Center at 7 Mile-M'belt

Simultaneous blasts of dynamite thirty miles apart last week initiated construction of identical shopping centers in Roseville Michigan and in Livonia, representing a total capital investment of \$50,000,000.

Immediately after the formal ceremonies, Mayor Richard Drager of Roseville, in the company of Louis H. Schostak of Schostak Brothers and Company developers, and easing agents, was transported from the Macomb Mall location to downtown Detroit by helicopter. At the same time, another helicopter took off from the Livonia Mall site, bringing to Livonia Mayor Harvey L. Moeckle and George R. Klein of Klein and Shenkman, Livonia Mall developers to Detroit.

The Honorable Ed Carey, Acting Mayor of Detroit, greeted the visiting Mayors on their arrival.

Full details of the two developments were divulged at a luncheon at Veterans Memorial Building.

Location of the Livonia Mall is Seven Mile and Middlebelt. The Macomb Mall location is Gratiot Avenue at Masonic Blvd. Target date for completion is Fall, 1964.

Sears, Roebuck and Co. and Crowley, Miller and Company will be the principal tenants at both centers. Sears' plans call for the construction of identical 320,000 thousand square foot buildings. Crowley's plans are for "Palm" stores covering 125,000 square feet each. They will be similar in design to their present suburban store, however, will be 25% larger than the existing suburban store.

Speaking for the exclusive leasing agents for both centers, Schostak Brothers & Company, Jerome L. Schostak announced that leases have already been signed for many of the 60 stores and services that each center will accommodate.
