Now Training In Peace Corp

Donald R. Shuster of 32071 Middlebelt Road in Farmington, among 35 Peace Corps Volunteers who have just completed 10 weeks of training on the campus of the University of Hawaii left Honolulu May 17 for North Borneo.

Upon arrival in Jesselton and Kuching, the capital cities, the volunteers will receive a period of orientation before beginning their duties in various parts of the country.

THE NEW GROUP will augment a contingent of 37 Volunteers who have been working in North Borneo since August, 1962, in the areas of education, health, and rural community development.

Volunteers assigned to the education project will teach secondary school English, general science, mathematics and biology. Among the Volunteers for the rural community development project will be several experienced road surveyors, a rural health nurse, and a veterinary doctor. Volunteers assigned to the health project will increase the number of lab technicians, nurses and social workers now at work in the Colony.

With the arrival of this group in North Borneo, the Peace Corps will have nearly 1,000 Volunteers serving in the Far East.

Plays call for 2,500 Volunteers to begin training at 32 colleges, universities, and private organizations throughout the United States for work in Asia, Africa and Latin America.

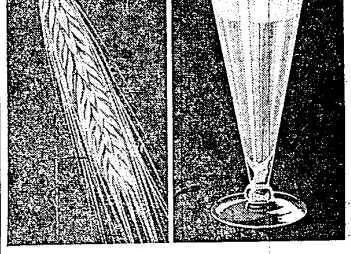
