Frank Kern, Jr., president of Maxitrol Company, 2555 Telegraph Road, Southfield, Mich., has been named one of Michigan's "outstanding living inventors" by the Michigan Patent Law Association. Mr. Kern lives at 25120 Grand Duke Dr., Farmington.



KERN WAS ONE of a group honored at the Association's 50th anniversary banquet recently held in Detroit. One of his patents covers Straight-Thru-Flow gas pressure regulators, upon which Maxitrol was founded. A mechanical engineering graduate from University of Michigan, Kern acquired the Detroit Regulator Company in 1946 after serving for a number of years as an engineer for Briggs Manufacturing Company. After the development of the Straight-Thru-Flow regulator, the firm name was changed to Maxitrol.

The company and its affiliates now operate four plants in Michigan. It has resident sales representatives throughout the U.S., plus representation in Canada, England and the Common Market.

"I have always liked music, especially the classics and opera," Regan said. "In order to understand it better I decided to study a language deeply involved with this form of music—German."
