Miss Mary Lynne Burley In Peru with Peace Corps

Miss Mary Lynne Burley of 1110 Orchard Lake Rd. in Farmington is among a group of 3 Peace Corps Volunteers in Peru on a nutrition program.

They will augment 45 Volunteers who have been working in this field since last September. The purpose of the project is to organize parents and teachers in various Peruvian villages to prepare and distribute food for elementary school children.

They use surplus food from the United States provided by the Agency for International Development. At the same time, the volunteers are able to influence and improve many other aspects of village life: sanitation, social work, housing, community recreation and education.

MISS BURLEY and these additional Volunteers, invited by the Peruvian Government, will make possible the expansion of a school lunch program into new villages in the department of Cuzco, Puno, Arequipa, Chimu, and Iquitos. Experience has proved the school lunch program not only increases school attendance from 30 percent to 70 percent, but also results in the arrival of this new, more attentive, healthy children group of Volunteers there will be a total of 283 Peace Corps volunteers in Peru—the largest Peace Corps program in Latin America. Besides nutrition they are working in the fields of sanitation, Indian education, agriculture, credit co-operatives, university teaching, handicraft instruction, savings and loan organization, and urban community development.

The Volunteers were prepared for their work in Peru by a month of rugged training and physical conditioning at the Peace Corps Training Camp in Puerto Rico. This was followed by 10 weeks of intensive training at the University of Washington in Seattle.

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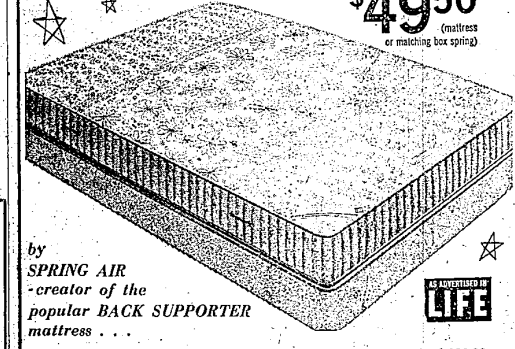
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
