Written Policies Aired by Board

Three proposed written policies for the Farmington public school system on separate subjects were discussed at some length by the Board of Education at its meeting Monday night.

One of these was a policy regarding student safety in the event an emergency should develop while the students are in school. The Board asked for some revisions but agreed that the administration should proceed in drawing up the final policy draft with the changes suggested incorporated.

On a policy regarding the philosophy of the school system regarding its arms the Board felt that more study was needed before a district-wide philosophy was developed. The Board did approve the philosophy for North Farmington High as submitted and revised earlier, however.

The third written policy suggested was one having to do with the handling of library books with an area dealing with procedure on taking objectionable books off the school library shelves. Some very critical comments were made by Trustee Herbert Neal on the proposed policy as drawn up but other Board members felt it was quite sound.

The final decision was to delay any action on this proposed policy until Board members have had more time to study it in detail.
