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

For the second successive year, the North Farmington Little League organization has been awarded the district tournament for southeastern Michigan. All-All teams from Farmington, North Farmington, and other areas are scheduled for playoff games to select which team will represent this area in the regional game at Eton Park in Birmingham on July 25.

FRANK R. REYNOLDS, area tournament director, outlined the following schedule for the playoffs: Tuesday, July 23 with the games scheduled to commence at 5:15 p.m.

The Bond School Diamond No. 1 will have Walled Lake facing Novi.

At Diamond No. 2 the North Farmington National League All-Stars, managed by Carl Oppenbauer, will meet the pre-tournament favorites from Milford.

At Ward Eagle diamond, the All-Stars from South Farmington will play the stars of the North Farmington American League, managed by Harry Kujawa. Fenton drew a bye for the opening round, and will face the winner of the Novi Walled Lake game on Wednesday, July 24.
