EASY RHYMING GAME.

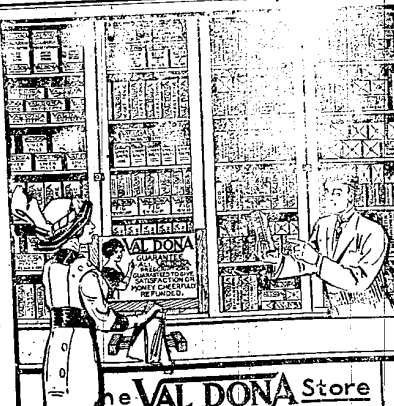
