Sewer Bond Bid Opening Tonite

At a special session tonight, Thursday, August 1, the Township Board will receive bids on the sale of bonds to finance the construction of both the Holly Hills subdivision and Franklin Hills Golf and Country Club sewer systems.

Approval for the sale of \$85,000 worth of bonds to finance the construction of these two sewer systems was given by the Township Board in July at the Municipal Finance Commission in Lansing.

The new two-unit building, of contemporary design, will replace the bank's present quarters at the Grand River-Farmington Road intersection and will provide 7,000 square feet of

banking facilities. Landscaped parking grounds will be provided to accommodate more than 60 cars.

One unit of the new structure will be for general banking functions. The other will be devoted entirely to the Installoan Department.

"OUR INSTALOAN service has proved so popular in Farmington that we found it necessary some years ago to provide separate quarters for it," Lapham explained. "We have found that this enables us to give faster, more convenient service to our Installoan customers."

Three drive-in windows will be located on the south side of the general banking unit. Safe Deposit and Night Depository facilities will also be provided.

The new structure will occupy property which has a 223-foot frontage on Farmington Road and 215-foot frontage on Alta Loma, and is about 600 feet from the present office.

ACCORDING TO the building's designer, Keith Siperly of the architectural-engineering firm of Smith, Hinchman and Grylls, a special effort was made to make the new bank office harmonize with its surroundings. Some of the handsome existing trees on the prop-

erty will be saved. An attractive masonry wall will separate the bank area from surrounding residential property.

Charcoal colored brick will be blended with white masonry to form architectural accents in harmony with nearby structures.

The George W. Auch Co. has been awarded the contract for constructing the building, which is expected to be ready for occupancy next spring.

OVER 160 APTS. PLANNED

Twp. Zoning Board Sets Date For Hearings On Re-zoning Requests

At its regular meeting last Thursday night, the Township Zoning Board took action setting the date for a public hearing on one request for re-zoning to permit a large apartment-unit development and referred a second request to the Township's planning consultants for their study and recommendations.

The apartment-re-zoning request for which a hearing date has been set involves a parcel of land at Nine Mile and Gill Road where the Associated Investment Companies, Inc. hopes to construct a 120-unit apartment development and referred a second request to the Township's planning consultants for their study and recommendations.

The second request for re-zoning for apartments involves a strip of land along the south side of Independence Street between Oxford and Colwell streets. The strip of land, approximately 885 feet deep with a total land area of slightly over seven acres, is adjacent to the site of the new Botsford General Hospital. The parcel is now zoned R-4 (single family residential).

The owner, John Walser of Pontiac, wishes to construct 51 apartment units there.

THE BOARD asked Walser to present a layout of the type of development he proposes at the next regular meeting, on September 26.

One is a request for enlargement of a commercial site at the northwest corner of 12 Mile and Halsted roads to permit the construction of a gas station. The petitioners, Harry and Lillian Dachele of Detroit, seek to have the commercial corner expanded to a size of 200 by 200 feet. At present only 165 by 200 feet of this corner is zoned for commercial use. The property around it is zoned R-4.

The other is a request for re-zoning from R-4 to B-1 (commercial) of a 1.43-acre parcel at the northeast corner of Nine Mile and Middlebelt roads. It is proposed to construct a food market and drug or hardware store there.

Before taking action setting the public hearing date, the Board made it clear that it would not even consider the re-zoning if there were any plans for a gas station there.

The plaintiff's content that as an apartment development such as Duke proposes is allowed it will block their views from their homes, cause more nuisances and greatly decrease the value of their properties.

Prior to the Council's unanimous action favoring the re-zoning the parcel had been zoned for three different uses. That portion fronting on Grand River was zoned industrial, another portion for residential and parking, and a small area in the extreme rear for single family residential.

The City Council's recent action approving re-zoning of a 3.41-acre parcel west of the American Legion Hall to permit a large apartment development will be tested in court this coming Monday, Aug. 5.

City officials have been asked to present their case for favoring the re-zoning of this parcel before Judge John Beer in Oakland County Circuit Court.

A temporary injunction limiting a start on the proposed 112-unit apartment development at this location was obtained by the four homeowners on the south side of Sherwood Street to the rear of the American Legion Hall property. These homeowners are John Galloway, Jr., Earl Keller, David Woodruff and Mr. Clouse.

IT WILL BE up to the City, through its attorney, Robert Kelly, to show cause why a permanent injunction should not be granted preventing the development of this parcel in this manner now or in the future.

Shortly after the request for the re-zoning was made by Thomas Duke, local builder and developer, the four plaintiffs made it clear that they were vigorously opposed. Hearings before both the Planning Commission and Council were held.

Ground is Broken for Eagle School Addition

Ground has now been broken for the new addition to be constructed at the Eagle elementary school on 14 Mile Road just west of Middlebelt Road, Byron Oliver, assistant superintendent in the Farmington School District, announced this week.

The addition as well as some site improvements are scheduled for completion prior to the start of the second semester of the 1963-64 school year, Oliver said.

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
