

**School Districts To Get Large Check**

A check for \$2,226,623.94 from Michigan Bell Telephone Company will be distributed among school districts throughout the state.

The money, earmarked for the state primary school fund, represents Michigan Bell's largest single state property tax payment in history.

It covers the first half of 1963. Another check for a like amount will be paid next November.

Michigan Bell's property tax money is allocated to school districts on the basis of local school census figures.
