Richard A. Utley of 28565 Middlebelt Road in Farmington died in St. Mary Hospital, Livonia August 1 after a lingering illness of some 12 months duration. He was 55 years old.

Funeral services were held August 5 at 2 p.m. from the Spencer J. Heeney Funeral Home in Farmington where the body rested. The Rev. Eugene R. Sims officiated at the service. Burial was at E.A. S. Farmington Cemetery in Farmington.

MR. UTLEY was a factory worker with the Ford Motor Company. He had been a resident of the community all his life. He was a member of the Allen Road United Mission Church in Southgate, Michigan. Restrictions of Assn. Upheld in Court Case Test

Residents of Winwood Hills Estates, a subdivision in Franklin Village, won a lengthy court fight Friday of last week in which restrictions limiting the use of property in their subdivision to residential purposes only were being tested.

Circuit Judge Stanton G. Dandero granted a permanent injunction against the construction of a horse barn planned by subdivision resident Harold Groos of 38353 Woodside.

Foundations for the barn were laid in 1962 but all construction was then halted when the subdivision association sought and obtained a temporary restraining order August of that year. This prohibited any additional work from that time until now.

UNDER THE final order issued by Judge Dandero existing footings and foundations must now be removed.

The argument of the plaintiffs was that construction of the horse barn in this location would constitute a real nuisance and that, considering the established residential nature of the area, the restrictions as originally established by the Thompson-Brown Co. and adopted as a part of the deed to the Winwood Hills Association, should be strictly enforced.

Representing the plaintiffs in this cause was local attorney, Edwin R. Oglesby.

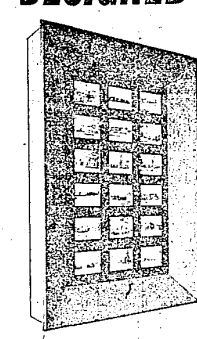
