

## Detroit Asks For Help On Water Dilemma

The City of Detroit water department is now asking for suggestions on how it can recuperate a substantial sum of revenues it is losing as the result of a recent State Supreme Court Decision ruling added charges against non water conserving air conditioning equipment users illegal.

Since only three or four such users exist in the City of Farmington little money in extra charges will have to be refunded locally. City Manager John Dinan estimated earlier, however, that the City of Detroit was going to have to rebate over \$2 million as a result of the court decision.

It was the feeling of the city manager that it should be the responsibility of each community using Detroit water to rebate the monies now ruled to have been illegally collected and find its own method for making up for the lost source of revenue in the future. Councilmen concurred with him on this.

City Manager John Dinan and councilmen agreed that it would be grossly unfair to charge higher water rates to all Detroit water users in all communities to make up for this lost source of revenues.

The Council instructed the city manager to write a letter to Detroit water officials expressing these feelings on the matter.

There were 2,700 automobiles in Michigan when the state highway department was created in 1905. The state now has more than 3.4 million registered motor vehicles.

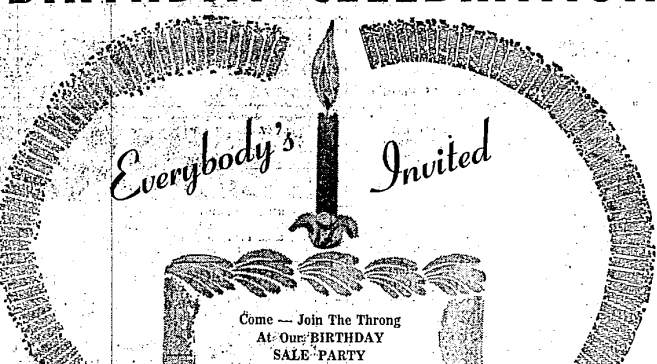
