Area Athletes Slated For Physical Check Ups

Farmington public and parochial school athletes are scheduled for physical examinations on Wednesday and Thursday, August 21 and 22, at two locations in the community. Farmington Senior High School on August 21 and North Farmington High School on August 22.

Medical doctors and osteopathic physicians in the community give of their time each year to provide athletes with a physical check ups which are required before youths can participate in any extracurricular sports.

ALL ATHLETES are urged to report on either of the two days this month for physical examination regardless of whether they are to participate in other than fall sports. Basketball, track and golf athletes are expected to have their physical examination along with football and cross-country athletes.

The schedule set up for physicals this year will follow the pattern established in previous years with senior high athletes the first to be processed, beginning at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, August 21, at FHS. Junior high athletes are scheduled to report for physicals at 10 a.m. with little league and grade school athletes to follow them at 11 a.m. The schedule will hold for both days of the examinations, which will cost each boy \$1.
