Leaky Roofs Still Problem

Serious leaky roof problems at four or five schools in the Farmington public school system which has been the topic of discussion for the past several months now came in for another round of airing at the regular Board of Education meeting Monday night.

Conversation was centered around steps that have been taken in an effort to get the roof bonding company to stand the cost of a new roof or major repairs to the roof over the gymnasium area at Farmington Senior High.

During the course of the conversation, at least two or three of the board members expressed dissatisfaction with the work that has been done to date by the special roofing consultants hired to recommend and take action to get the required repair work done.

No action was taken but the matter is scheduled for still further discussion at the August 26 meeting of the Board.

A total of 5.3 acres are set aside for a swim club in Kimberley East which will have a maximum membership of 300. Board members felt, after some discussion on the subject, that sufficient parking area and grounds were provided in the acreage set aside for the swim club development.

Trustee Byron Waller raised the point that Township Zoning regulations were "excessive" in the requirements for parking space in ventures of the nature of a swim club. He was given assurances that planners had included ample provisions for parking in the proposed subdivision swim club plan.

Trustee Peter Offelt raised another point in connection with subdivision development which received favorable responses from other Board members.

Offelt expressed the need for sidewalk right-of-way along section line roads abutting subdivision developments. It was his feeling that the cost of providing sidewalks for school children who must travel to school along such roads should be absorbed by the subdivision developers.

An amendment to the subdivision regulations incorporating the sidewalk right-of-way measure proposed by Offelt is being drafted and will be presented for further consideration at the next regular meeting of the Township Board.

an economic viewpoint. Conditions are also outlined in the proposed ordinance setting up closing dates for land fill operations and penalties where assigned schools.

STILL TO BE included are exceptions to the ordinance which would allow homeowners to accomplish landscaping and grading work on their own property of a nature not offensive or damaging to abutting land owners.

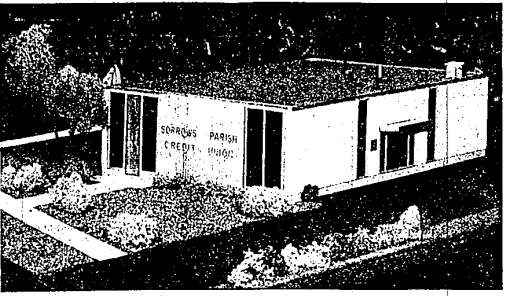
It was emphasized by Supervisor Hall that the spirit of the proposed ordinance was the control of such operations which would result in nuisance and give rise to health hazards in the surrounding area. Normal gardening and landscaping by residents in the Township would not be restricted.

Civille Board of Ed. Shifts Grade Units

The Clarenceville Board of Education, in view of the fact that the addition to the Botsford Elementary School has not been completed, acted on a report received from the administration regarding housing for fifth and sixth grade pupils.

Plans presented included housing of three fifth grade units at the Grandview Elementary School and three sixth grade units at the Senior High School, until such time as the rooms now being constructed at Botsford are ready for use.

It is hoped that the additional rooms at Botsford will be ready for occupancy even on a limited basis by later than October.

Small Tuition Rate Hike Is Authorized

A slight hike in rates for the non-resident pupils who will be enrolled in the Farmington public school system for the coming year was officially approved by the Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night.


The rate for grade school children will be raised from the \$135 a year charged last year to \$140 this coming year. For junior and senior high students the rate will go up from \$155 to \$200.

843 Broaden Knowledge in Summer School

A total of 843 boys and girls took courses in the Farmington public school system's summer school program concluded the first part of this month, a report from Director Richard Tyler released this week disclosed.

This is a substantial increase over the number enrolled in the program offered for the first time a year ago, Tyler said.

A breakdown of this total showed 322 enrolled in regular classroom courses offered junior and senior high students and another 122 in regular upper elementary grade classes.

There were 175 attracted to the summer driver education course and 150 enrolled in instrumental music. Another 74 were given special education training.

The heaviest enrollment by grade level for regular classes excluding basketball courses was recorded for 11th graders. There were a total of 11 eleventh graders signed up in summer school. Eighth graders were second behind with 62 being enrolled.

The bulk of this enrollment came from schools in the Farmington public school system but there were 26 enrolled from Our Lady of Sorrows parochial school and one or two students from a number of schools outside Farmington area.

Classes offered this summer included social studies and general science, typing, English, drama, reading, creative drama, mathematics, world history, U.S. history, basketball, driver education and instrumental music.

Tyler indicated that the program is almost certain to be continued in summers to come and that it will be expanded to meet demands for subject areas which can possibly be offered.

Industrial Development Study Given Planners

An Industrial Development report to be included as a part of the Master Plan which is nearing completion for the City of Farmington was turned over to the Planning Commission Monday night and reviewed.

The report includes a review of the industrial picture for this area and several suggestions regarding ways in which greater amounts of good additional industrial establishments might be attracted into the city.


