Let Contracts for School Roof Repairs

Contracts were awarded by the Farmington Board of Education Monday night for roof repairs at two schools where serious problems with roof leaks have been encountered.

The action awarding contracts came following the opening of bids for three contractors for each job. The low bidders agreed to do work at the Longfellow School for \$1,124 and at Farmington Junior High for \$7,792.

Approval on the letting of the contracts was given subject to a study of low bidders' specifications and approval of them by special roofing consultants hired earlier by the Board.

Dropout Study Broadened

light on the subject under study. Herbert Applegate, vice president of the Food Services Educational Association, pointed out the somewhat alarming fact that nearly 80 per cent of those dropping out of school go into restaurant work but don't stay long. There is a real need for trained people in the restaurant industry, he said. Pre-training or cooperative program training is necessary so that they can start work with some knowledge of the business and the opportunities it has to offer rather than having to be trained from scratch, he commented. Training programs in schools coordinated with the restaurant people was strongly advocated by him.

Det. Bielecki, industrial arts instructor at Farmington High, stated that he felt there was a real need for an expanded industrial training program in the local school system. Bielecki indicated that he thought a community size could well afford to have a vocational school.

A STUDY of all dropout cases in the community over the past few years and an effort to determine what these students who quit school before graduating are doing now, was strongly urged at the January meeting.

A report on the curriculum and programs offered at the junior-high level locally was given to the committee at the community meeting by Dr. J. D. Dustin, principal at Duncker Junior High. A similar report was made at the February meeting by Harold Hummel, principal at North Farmington High school.

There was a feeling expressed by members of the committee that there is a need for a greater amount of counseling at the junior high level in our school system.

Guest speaker at the February meeting of the committee was Lewis King, industrial co-ordinator at the Wilbur Wright Vocational High School in Detroit. He explained

in detail the workings of the vocational school and the requirements for acceptance into the school.

MANY "CO-OP" training areas are possible in a vocational school training program including trade, industries, retailing, office practices, hospital work, food preparation, etc. King pointed out. Students work at job part time and get paid. A regular wage and go to school a portion of the time, he explained.

Students are drawn to the Wilbur Wright School from all over Detroit, King said. The local committee. The functions and purposes of such a program as the vocational school offers are explained to students in the junior high grades. No student is eligible to enroll at Wilbur Wright, however, unless they have completed the tenth grade.

King emphasized the fact however, that a co-op program such as this required close cooperation and working between the school and the firm hiring students on a part time basis. King made it clear that he did not feel the co-op schooling program would be helpful in reducing dropouts. Those who drop out of school, he stated, would probably not have good enough records in school to get into the Wilbur Wright School.

THE RECOMMENDATION made by King was that the Farmington schools consider a half-day and school half-day rather than the Wilbur Wright type of cooperative program.

At the February meeting, a report was also made by Mrs. Schwartz and Virginia Carley, high school counselor, on contact made with hospital people to determine what kind of cooperative training programs might be able to be worked out with them. They reported that while some expressed interest in a cooperative program others did not. The problem here presently would be finding a hospital close enough whereby a suitable co-op program could function successfully, it was emphasized.

Offering New Phone Service

The Michigan Public Service Commission approved a petition of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company to offer greatly expanded calling privileges into Detroit on an optional basis for telephone users here. Referred to as SEAS, super extended area service, the service will be offered on a trial basis to determine customer acceptance.

Under the plan, residence telephone users in the Greenleaf, Garfield, Fieldbrook, Glenview and 46 exchanges who subscribe to SEAS would be able to call up to half a million telephones in an area including downtown and midtown Detroit on an unlimited basis, without toll or message unit charges.

Business customers will enjoy the same service except that one message unit (42 cents) would be charged for each call, regardless of length, to the portion of the super extended area that is in the Detroit zone. Today, business subscribers pay either toll charges or multi-message units for these calls.
