SECTION 28. Petitioners request that the following described property be rezoned from RA-2 (single residential), to RC (multiple family residential), for reasons set forth.

21.8 acres in the East 1/2 of the SW1/4 of Section 23 bounded on the south by Nine Mile Road, on the east by Gill Road and on the north by Lytle Road. Recorded in Oakland County Records, Farmington Township, Michigan as F438-B-1. It is proposed that Garden Type Apartment Units will be constructed.

SECTION 25. Petitioner requests that the following described property be rezoned from RA-4 (single residential) to B-1 (Local business) for reasons set forth.

1.43 acres in the SW1/4 of Section 25 and located at the NE corner of Nine Mile Road and Middlefield Road. It is recorded in Oakland County Records, Farmington Township, Michigan as P421. It is proposed that the property will be put to the following use: food market, drug or hardware store and have masonry building construction. Lot has frontage of 201 and 265 feet and is 201x265 feet in size.

SECTION 7. Petitioner requests that the following described property having a dimension of 165 feet by 200 feet and a present zoning of B-1 (Local business district) be enlarged to a dimension of 280x200 feet and have the zoning B-1 (Local business) zoning. The petition to be rezoned is of B-1 (single residential) zoning. The property is part of Breeze and is located at the NW corner of Twelve Mile Road and Middlefield Road in SE4 of Section 7, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan. Reason for requested rezoning is to provide an adequate site for business activity and future use. Existing use is inadequate for business use. The dimensions shown are from the centerlines of both highways. The proposed use is stated as for the construction of a gas station.
