

Little League Rockets Bow in Grid Opener 21-12

The Farmington Rockets put on a valiant display in the fourth quarter but fell short in their effort to overhaul the team from East Detroit.

E. Detroit started fast taking the opening kickoff and marching over for the first TD. The run for the extra point was successful and the visitors led 7-0. This was followed by another surge that covered 31 yards capped by a 7-yard shot into the end zone by the E. Detroit right half.

The extra point made it 14-0.

HIGHLIGHTING the second period was the fine defensive play of both teams. Sparking the defense for the Rockets were Terry Spriggs, Mark Heumann, Bob Dwyer, Dennis McGlory and Tom Collins. A brilliant tackle by Tom Collins prevented an E. Detroit touchdown as the first half ended.

Farmington's bid to score in the third period was stymied by a fumble on 14-20. Detroit's yard line after a 49-yard march spirited by the running of Mark Toohy, Chris Charles and Phil Courten, ending strong blocking in the line.

The visitors scored on a long run before the period ended for

21-0 lead.

After a fumble recovered by Mark Lueders, Greg Hatter after- nating his ball carriers, Cour- ville and Charles, moved to the yard line where he scooped the extra point failed.

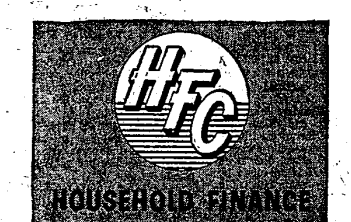

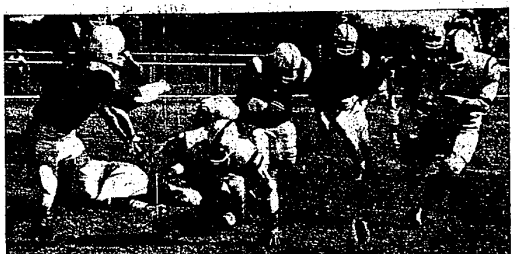

Raiders Blank C'ville 21-0 in Grid Opener

North Farmington opened up their 1963 season with a 21-0 victory by downing Clarencville 21-0.

North Farmington received the kickoff, started to move, but were stalled on a fumble. Clarencville ran its first play from scrimmage and the hard-hitting Raiders gained possession of the seemingly slippery plopskin on a CHS misce.

Neither team could muster much of an offense however, until with about three minutes and fifty seconds remaining in the first period of play, Jim Accilli danced 97 yards and kicked the point after touchdown to give NF a 7-0 advantage as the teams traded sides.

"ACE" AGAIN got the go sign with about four minutes gone in the second stanza as he ripped off a 7-yard TD and split the uprights to give Northern a 14-0 lead which ended the half.

NFHS kicked to the Trojans but for the first half of the third quarter both teams just played with the ball. The Raider defense was superb but offensive misuses hampered Northern's attack. With less than six minutes remaining in the period, Northern's defense put on a goal-line stand inside their five-yard line which displayed some of its defensive might.

JIM ACCILLI, turned in his third touchdown and third extra point in the fourth period as he glanced off tackle for nine yards and six points. A 15-yard penalty forced the Raiders to try for the PAT from the 17-yard line, with a fake kick. Ace ran the end-to make it 21-0, Raiders.

North Farmington collected only nine first downs to CHS' eight but in total yardage NF had a decidedly big edge outscoring the Trojans 335 yards to 135.

Jim Accilli, who co-captains the team, was the only person

who scored for either team as he tucked up 21 points while averaging 8.4 yards per carry.

The Raiders will meet Tri-River rival, Riverside, from last year in a non-league battle on NF's field Saturday, September 21, at 2 p.m. Last year the Rebels downed the Raiders 25-6. Saturday the Raiders are hoping to avenge this score.
