

School Board Talks Insurance

A rather lengthy discussion was held at the last Farmington Board of Education meeting Monday on the need or desirability of requiring school personnel driving their own cars on school business to carry insurance.

School Attorney Robert Kelly pointed out that with this coverage already provided he saw no advantage in making it mandatory that school people have their own insurance.

The opinion of the administrative staff was that nearly all school personnel driving their cars on school business now have their own automobile insurance anyway.

The decision was that the present coverage plan is adequate.

President Leonard Clifford and Trustee Herbert Neal both pointed out that the corporation for which they are insured, that employees have their own insurance or drive a company car.

It was revealed during discussion that the school district already carries non-ownership coverage on all employees driving their cars.
