This week, as in last week's loss, the big "322" for North Redford made all the difference as he made several fine runs, scoring the only TD of the game.

Neither team was able to go much of anywhere during most of the first two periods, but just as the second period was coming to a close, Tom Huff capped a fine series of runs with a final 12 yard swing around right end. The extra point attempt failed as Redford couldn't split the center of Farmington's line.

NEAR THE CLOSE of the last period, Ken Haller and John Clayton running alternately showed some nice running form. They succeeded in moving the ball to the 22 yard line of North Redford. Also included in this series was a pass from Ken Haller to Kerry Burke. With a first down coming up, time ran out.

John Fleming, James Hart and Bruce Howard led the defense, coming up with big tackles to go when Plymouth and Dick Egloff got into the open and dashed 70 yards with a pass.

Plymouth scored three plays later on a four-yard drive by Roger Tobey, making the score 25-6. Two more scores were added in the fourth quarter on a 45-yard romp by Tobey and another short drive by Grady. The Falcons added another score in the final minute of play on a quarterback sneak by Dick Johnson.

Plymouth rolled up 324 yards on the ground compared with 246 for the Falcons. The Rockets also had the advantage through the air, 64 yards to six for Farmington.

Grady was the leading ground runner in the game, picking up 178 yards in 14 carries.

The Farmington Falcons will play their first "A" conference game against the Southfield Jays away on Friday, September 27, at 8 p.m.

Lancer Eleven Routs Pontiac St. Frederick's

Saturday night the Sorrows Lancers seemed to be apologizing for the Agatha game by beating St. Frederick's of Pontiac, 19-0. But the Lancers kept up their habit of having touchdowns called back. Last year's Sorrows had nine TD's taken back. So far in two games they already have had to return them.

The first quarter was Sorrows' best. Receiving the kick, they went to Fred's 45 yard line. Then Kelly Burke completed a pass to Rick Gort for the first touchdown in just 44 seconds. Less than three minutes later Sorrows scored again, this time by Dave Sutton with Gort making the extra point. Finally, two minutes later, a third TD was scored by Sita a Seosky making it 19-0; all this in the first quarter.

In the second quarter the Lancers had two TD's called back for offside. At the end of the third quarter, a pass by Gort was intercepted by Mike Shultz for another touchdown which was called back for clipping.

MOST OF THE Lancer passing was done in the second quarter. Passes from Burke to Hamilton totaled over 30 yards. The Burke to Kearney combination took Sorrows from the Rams' 33 yard line to their 12. A fake kick, a few plays later, got the winning team from Fred's 50 to their 22 yard line.

The fourth quarter saw the ball bounce from one team to the other beginning with Sorrows fumbling and losing the ball on Fred's 31. The Lancers then intercepted a pass and ran 17 yards. After four downs the losing team took over and were finally forced to kick. Fred's again took over, and again Sorrows intercepted a pass. A few plays later the game ended 19-0, the second victory for the Lancers.

The whole game was played on Fred's half of the field, and only one first down was gained by the Rams (this received on a Lancer penalty).

Next Sunday Our Lady of Sorrows will play host to St. Michaels of Pontiac on Farmington's field at 2:30.

Falcon Gridders Bow To Powerful Plymouth

The Farmington Falcon football team dropped its second straight game of the season to non-conference power Plymouth by the score of 37-12 last Friday night, under the lights at Plymouth.

The Falcons, who trailed all the way, were simply overpowered by the highly rated Rockets. The score at the end of the first quarter stood 12-0 against the Falcons.

The Rocks raised the score to 18-0 on a short burst by Grady early in the second quarter. Two plays later Farmington chalked up its first score of the season on a fine run of 55 yards by halfback Bruce Charles. Although they were still down 18-6 at this point, the Falcons seemed fired-up and began to move the ball. They drove 60 yards down the field to the Plymouth-seven-yard-line where they finally lost the ball on downs. The half ended with the Falcons on the short end of an 18-6 score.

Farmington started the third quarter by driving the entire length of the field, only to lose the ball on a fumble at the Plymouth 15-yard line.

Motorcycle Racing Here This Sunday

Motorcycle racing roars back into the Detroit area Sunday, September 29, when the five-state championships will be held at the Detroit Race Course. Schoolcraft and Middlebelt roads in Livonia.

More than 150 of the top riders from Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin are expected to compete in the program on the half-mile dirt track at DRC.

SPONSORED BY the Detroit Area Association of Motorcycle Clubs and the Metropolitan Club of Livonia, the sixth annual event will have prize money of nearly \$2,000.

There are 10 races scheduled, with competition divided into three rider classifications—novice, amateur and expert. Each division have two three-mile heat races and a five-mile final.

Only expert riders are eligible to compete for the five-state championship. Only the top 10 qualifiers in the time trials will be eligible in the 10-mile feature.

National champion Bart Markel, of Flint, will be back to defend the 10 mile title he won last year. One of the top contenders will be Livonia's Bates Moynihan, who recently captured the 1963 Michigan championship.

OTHER LEADING Detroit-area "expert" riders are Jerry Ashcroft, George Bartle, Sandy Freeman, Harold Hamann, of Detroit; Dave Ludwig of Clarkston; Larry Stone, of Farmington; and George Salo, of Roseville.

The motorcycleists will begin workouts at 10 a.m., with time trials starting at 12 noon. The first race is scheduled at 2 p.m.

Parking is free at the Detroit Race Course parking lot. All children 12 and under, accompanied by a parent, will be admitted free of charge to the races.
