Raiders Blank Riverside 17-0 For Second Victory

The Raiders of North Farmington powered their way to a seventeen to nothing victory over the Rebels from Riverside last Saturday on Northern's gridiron.

NFHS received the opening kickoff, but on the third play from scrimmage, Lyle Martini suffered a knee injury as he went back to pass. Dan McCutcheon bombed a forty-five yard punt where the Rebel halfback fumbled the ball, as NFHS Mike Fleming recovered.

Andy Lawing, junior quarterback came in to lead the team. North Farmington gained quick possession of the pigskin, and Bob Thomas ended a 70 yard drive when, leaving him with a flat pass and he raced in from the twelve. Accioli kicked the point after touchdown to give NF a 10-0 lead with ten minutes remaining in the half.

Although NF didn't score again the offensive unit controlled the football for the remainder of the game. Andy Lawing did a tremendous job of filling in for Lee Martini, as he led the Raiders to seventeen points within fifteen minutes. Jim Accioli continued to lead the team as he collected 11 points.

The Raiders will play Birmingham Groves in the league opener, Friday, September 27 at 8 p.m. North Farmington game time is 3:30 p.m.

Hunt captured first place as he set a new Farmington course record of 10:06, knocking 28 seconds off his former mark.

SECOND PLACE went to Meyer of Waterford, but only a step behind was sophomore Dan Nichols of Farmington.

Fourth position went to a Waterford harrier, but the fifth, sixth and seventh spots went to John Karwowski, John Lockwood and Ron McGee, respectively, of Farmington.

JIM HARVEY and Keith Watson rounded out the Falcon seven which proved to be too good for the Waterford runners.

The Farmington Senior High junior varsity harriers placed 16 runners across the finish line, but the first Waterford runner could not finish the two-mile course as the little Falcons won by the score of 15-50 staying undefeated in Inter-Lakes action.

One of the significant changes in transportation influencing our food supply is the rapid rise in highway transportation. His theme is "Blending Period Furniture with Modern Living."

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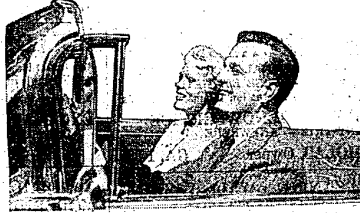
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NORTH FARMINGTON HIGH SCHOOL SPORTS SCHEDULE 1963 - 1964
