on television, all of which, according to Russell, supports his claim that Sheila is in no more dangerous than a large dog, although he concedes her appetite is substantially greater.
HAYING ATTRACTED considerable notoriety since first coming to the attention of Township officials, who understandably took the position that not everyone can be allowed to keep a lion as a pet. Sheila has been well fed by virtue of her ability to attract admiring crowds which promoters are willing to pay "steak" prices to get.
Russell has gained the sympathy of thousands of youngsters who have seen Sheila. She is being petted and played with, and has obtained some 80 signatures from residents in his neighborhood on a petition disclaiming any nuisance from having the animal on his property.
"IT WAS THE Township's claim that the lion was kept of such an animal on property zoned for residential uses constituted a violation since under the zoning ordinance any animal on property included the keeping of "naturally vicious animals."
Judge Ingles' opinion was that the zoning ordinance sets forth what a person can use on his property. So, such a position should not be upheld in the case of a lion, and at least for the present, a person is entitled to own property, and use it for whatever he chooses, subject to reasonable regulation by the people.
Judge Ingles' ruling apparently will stand since the Township does not have the right of appeal in a court case of this nature and it is unlikely from Sheila's wide popularity and acceptance that any civil court action will arise.

refuge. He said it was a natural area for wildlife and one of the few remaining such areas in the Township.
TOM COFFIELD, of 3742 Carson Road requested that the Board make certain that the engineering claims made in the topographic survey submitted by the Munn Contracting Company were certified correct by the health department. He was concerned over whether filling in the swamp on Pease's property would result in adverse affects to the water table and lead to pollution of the underground water supply of the Indianbrook Subdivision.
The Township's firm of consulting engineers, Pate, Hirm and Bogue, checked the Munn Company's topographic survey and advised the Board it was within the legal requirements.
What action the Board will take will be revealed at a special meeting Monday night, September 30, at 7:30 p.m. If the permit request is denied at that time, the Township may be faced with waging another court battle similar to the Keller case which cost \$3,500.
