Bowen is a native of Detroit, joined the Burroughs marketing division in sales and personnel work after his graduation from Dartmouth College.

He entered the United States Army in 1942 as an enlisted man and was discharged from active duty as a captain after service in the United States and Europe. In 1946 he was named assistant to the president and in 1952 became director of organizational services.

Bowen is a trustee of the McGregor Fund, Merrill Palmer Institute and St. Luke's Episcopal Church Home. He also is a director of the Detroit chapter, American Red Cross.

He is married, has two daughters and lives in Grosse Pointe.

Lombard, formerly in banking, began his career with Burroughs in the Detroit branch in 1927 as a salesman. Shortly thereafter he was transferred to the company's marketing headquarters and specialized in the banking division for 18 years.

In 1948 he was named assistant treasurer. Lombard was born in Whitaker, Mich. He and Mrs. Lombard live in Detroit.

PFLEIFER, joined Burroughs in 1931. He graduated from the University of Detroit and subsequently received his Master's degree from the same university in 1955. Prior to the new appointment he had served as controller-assistant treasurer of the Burroughs Finance Corporation, director of corporate systems and procedure, and chief corporate accountant.
