A meeting of the Citizens Advisory Council of the Committee on a proposed Oakland County community college has been called for Wednesday, October 16, at 8 p.m. in the Oak and Schools offices.

Wendell Brown, acting chairman of the steering committee, invited any other citizen who wish to help in promoting the establishment of community colleges.

A county-wide vote in June favored the establishment of a college but rejected a one mill tax to support the institution under state law. Tax support must be voted at the same time the establishment of a community college is approved.

The Oakland Schools Board of Education has indicated a second vote on the community college issue will be placed on the ballot in the June 8, 1954 school election.

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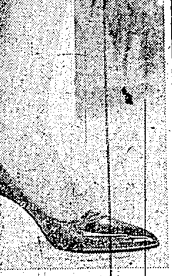

As an added attraction there will also be a complete selection of hand made "Barbie" doll clothes.

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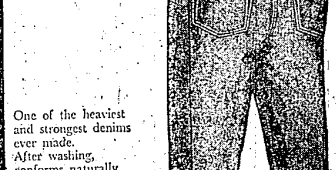
