Roy Leach Powers for TD As FHS Ties Waterford 6-6

The Farmington Falcons football team took over second place in the Inter-Lakes League, although held to a 6-6 tie by the Skippers of Waterford.

The Falcons started like tigers, grinding out a 75-yard touchdown march the first time they got their hands on the ball. Roy Leach carried for the last four yards of the drive as the Falcons took an early 6-0 lead. The extra point kick was made at the end of the first quarter of play. Farmington held the six-point edge.

The Skippers evened the count just before halftime on a brilliant 70-yard run by speedy halfback Rick LaBar. The extra point try was blocked by Jim Stevenson and, at the end of the half, the teams were deadlocked 6-6.

Although each team threatened twice in the third period of play, neither could light the scoreboard.

Neither team could score in the final stanza either, but some of the game's most anxious moments came in the last two minutes of the game. With 1:27 left in the game, Dick Johnston intercepted a pass on the Waterford 47. On the next play, Waterford recovered a Farmington fumble on the 50 yard line and two plays later, Roy Leach intercepted at the Falcon 35 as the game ended in a 6-6 tie.

NFHS Harriers Defeat League Rival Groves

Thursday, September 26, the North Farmington Harriers defeated the visiting Birmingham Groves squad 23-6.

Doug Wood and Larry Muzzarelli of the Raiders placed 12 respectively, until it was declared that Wood cut a 11.8 g, thus disqualifying him from competition, although he finished the two-mile race not realizing this and posting a fine time of 10:55.

Muzzarelli, who holds the school record with a blistering time of 10:07, turned in a fine time of 11:07 for first place. The Groves runner finished second with a time of 11:20.

In the Raiders next meet, October 3, Wood placed first, with a time of 10:24, second was Scheer with a time of 10:36. This combination of 1st - 2nd place combined with holds of older places yielded an 18-6 victory to North Farmington over Oak Park.
