1st Gun Safety Program To Be Presented Tonight

A GUN SAFETY PROGRAM is to be held tonight (Thursday, October 10) from 7 p.m. until 9 p.m. in the Farmington Junior High School on Thomas Street presents an opportunity for all boys and girls and their fathers to take advantage of a newly devised test which may soon be adopted by the Michigan legislature as a requirement for getting a hunting license.

The test, given under the auspices of the National Rifle Association, representative who will direct tonight's program at the junior high school, John Griffin, has been divided into two parts of two hours duration each. The first two-hour test portion will be presented tonight and the balance of the test will be administered on Wednesday evening, October 16, at the junior high school, 7 p.m. until 9 p.m.

Jack Cyr, the faculty adviser of the Farmington Junior High School's Gun Club, is primarily responsible for arranging the comprehensive Gun Safety program. The Farmington Optimist Club has worked closely with him in order to bring the program to all of the interested persons in the community.
