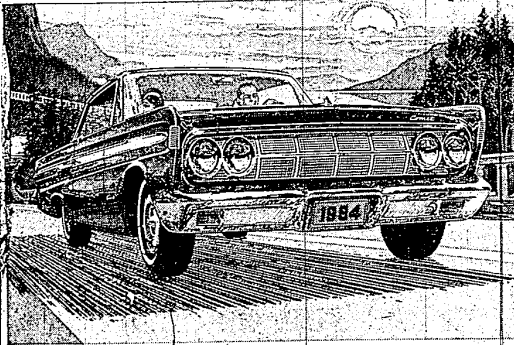

### Will Up-Grade Libraries in Dist. Schools

School librarians will take stock of their goods and services during the next three weeks as the first step in a long range up-grading program of public school libraries in the 04 and 05 County Regional School Library Association.

Robert Snow, librarian for Oakland Schools, and chairman of the committee for library improvement, said a report on the survey should be available by November 1.

THIS FALL, Snow said, the 20 districts that comprise Oakland Schools have 150 librarians on their faculties.

Last spring Oakland Schools librarians formed a regional group of the Michigan Association of School Librarians. The survey is the first major project of the new group, Snow said.

Members of the library improvement committee include Snow, Mrs. Evelyn Davis, librarian at Wever School, Pontiac, Mrs. Joan Hough and Mrs. Bernadine Blosser, elementary librarians in Farmington Schools.

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## Dr. H. P. Kagen Awarded Grant For Research

Dr. Herbert P. Kagen, member of the Board of the Claesius School District, has been awarded a grant to conduct scientific research, the Detroit Institute of Technology has announced.

The \$2,000 National Science Foundation grant will be used by Dr. Kagen, associate professor of chemistry at DIT, for his studies in the chemistry of Friedelin and its derivatives. Friedelin is a substance which naturally occurs in the bark of trees.

IN THE PAST his research work has been related to cancer, arteriosclerosis and organo-chemical problems.

He received his B. A. degree from MIT, an M. S. degree from the University of Rhode Island and his Ph.D. degree from WSU. Dr. Kagen has been with DIT, Detroit's downtown college, since 1957.

He and his wife, Pearl, are the parents of three children: Bradley, 5; Beth, 3; and Michael, 17 months.

## VILLAGE ELECTION

To the Qualified Electors:  
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That an Annual Village Election will be held in the VILLAGE OF QUAKERTOWN, State of Michigan Within said Village on

**Tuesday, November 5, 1963**  
FOR THE PURPOSE OF VOTING FOR THE ELECTION OF THE FOLLOWING OFFICERS, VIZ:

- One Village President
- One Village Clerk
- One Village Treasurer
- Two Councilmen for Two Years
- One Assessor

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER OF THE VILLAGE OF QUAKERTOWN

1. Paragraph (a) of Section 9 of Chapter III to be amended as follows:

(a) The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Village. He shall preside at the meetings of the Council. He shall be deemed a member of the Council with the right to vote upon any question. He shall from time to time give the Council information concerning the affairs of the Village and recommend such measures as he may deem expedient. It shall be his duty to exercise supervision over the affairs of the Village and over the public property belonging thereto and to see that the laws relating to the Village and the ordinances and regulations of the Council are enforced.

2. Amend Section 12 of Chapter III to read as follows:

"Section 12. The Village Council shall have the power to create the offices of the Village marshal, road commissioner, attorney, auditor, zoning inspector, building inspector and similar positions deemed necessary to the operation of the Village and not provided for elsewhere in this Charter. The Village Council shall prescribe the duties thereof and set the compensation therefor. All such offices shall be filled by appointment by the Village President, with notice to the Village Council; provided, however, that if the Village President fails to appoint any such officer within ninety days after such office becomes vacant such office shall be filled by appointment by the Village Council; and provided further, that the Village Council may by a majority vote thereof veto any such appointment made by the Village President within ninety days after notice to the Council of such appointment.

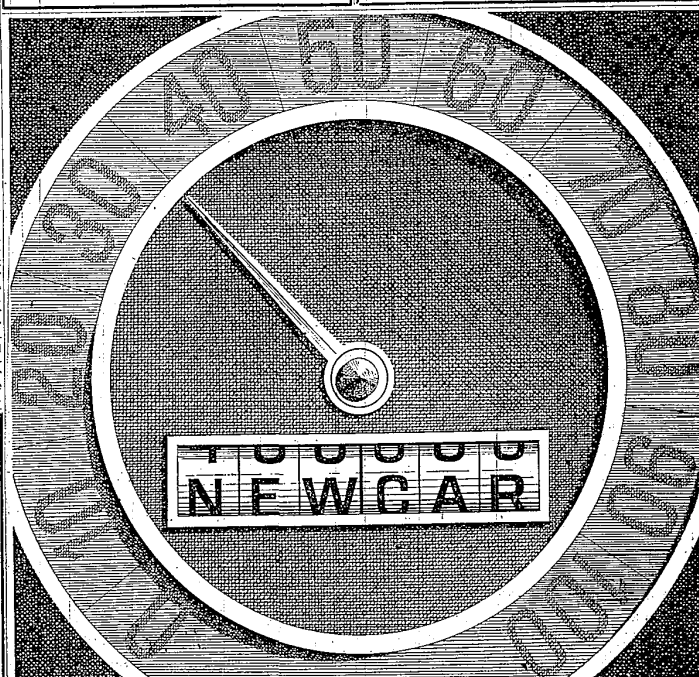
Notice Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls

ELECTION LAW, ACT 116, P. A. 1954

SECTION 720. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continuously open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

THE POLLS of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a.m. and will remain open until 8 o'clock p.m. of said day of election.
