Persons who may be interested are invited to participate in discussion of the following new or amended sections proposed to be included in the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Farmington:

ARTICLE IV

SECTION 400—PRINCIPAL USES PERMITTED

Subsection 2.

The following agricultural uses not otherwise included within the definition of accessory uses:

- a. The growing of edible produce
- b. The raising and selling of dairy and/or beef cattle, sheep, goats or pigs, and the growing of feed therefor; provided that buildings to house such animals shall not be located within 200 feet of the property lines of the parcel of land upon which the animals are being raised, and provided further, that no slaughtering of animals shall be done except such animals as have been raised on the premises or have been maintained upon the premises prior thereto and for the use and consumption of persons residing on the premises.
- c. The raising and selling of fowl or rabbits; provided such animals are properly maintained in a sanitary manner and that buildings to house such animals shall not be located within 75 feet of the property lines of the parcel upon which such animals are being grazed.

*Accessory uses and accessory buildings, provided that accessory buildings are located as required in ARTICLE XIV, "GENERAL PROVISIONS."

SECTION 401

Recall sale of any of the products set forth in Section 400, Subsection 2, subject to the following:

- a. Sale shall be made only from the premises where the product was produced.
- b. No permanent structure shall be erected in connection with such sales, and all temporary structures shall be removed when such products have been disposed of.
- c. Off-street parking shall be provided for not less than five automobiles.
- d. The permit shall be limited to one year but may be renewed by the Board of Appeals without additional appeal fee.

SECTION 403—NUISANCES

No activity or use shall be permitted in any RA-1, RA-2, RA-3, or RA-4 District which creates or contributes to the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration or noise or disposal of wastes, becomes or constitutes a nuisance or is unreasonably obnoxious or offensive to persons residing in such residential district.

ARTICLE V

SECTION 500—PRINCIPAL USES PERMITTED

Subsection 3.

Accessory Uses and accessory buildings, provided that accessory buildings are located as required in ARTICLE XIV, "GENERAL PROVISIONS."

ARTICLE VI

SECTION 600—PRINCIPAL USES PERMITTED

Subsection 5.

SECTION 1100—PRINCIPAL USES PERMITTED

ARTICLE XIV

SECTION 1400—USES NOT OTHERWISE INCLUDED WITHIN A SPECIFIC USE DISTRICT

Subsection 6.

Public Riding and/or Boarding Stables may be permitted in Residential Districts on special permit issued by the Board of Appeals (renewable every 2 years after review by the Board of Appeals) in accordance with such reasonable conditions as the Board of Appeals shall impose.

The following shall be imposed as minimum conditions by the Board of Appeals:

- a. Public Riding and/or Boarding Stables may be permitted on unsubdivided parcels of not less than forty (40) acres.
- b. Stables, paddock areas for instruction or paddock areas for the confinement of horses near stables shall be at least 300 feet from any property lines.
- c. Private paths, and all other riding areas shall be confined to the site of continuous acreage.
- d. Adequate off-street parking shall be provided on the site.
- e. Floodlights or any source of artificial lighting for night riding shall be prohibited. Lighting for the exterior illumination of the stable area shall be directed away from and shall be shielded from adjacent residential districts.
- f. Loud speakers for outdoor use shall be prohibited.
- g. The premises shall be regularly sprayed or treated so as to control insects and odors.
- h. A plot plan drawn to scale, designating all of the above areas, shall be submitted to the Board of Appeals.

Subsection 7.

Nurseries and Greenhouses may be permitted in residential districts on special permit issued by the Board of Appeals (renewable every two years after review by the Board of Appeals) in accordance with such reasonable conditions as the Board of Appeals shall impose.

The following shall be imposed as minimum conditions by the Board of Appeals:

- a. Operations to be conducted shall be limited to the growing of flowers, trees, bushes, shrubs and other ornamental produce and for the retail sales of such produce from the parcel of property on which it was grown.
- b. The premises on which said operations are to be conducted shall not be less than two acres in area.
- c. Such premises shall front upon a section line road or Grand River Road.
- d. Off-street parking shall be provided for not less than five automobiles.
- e. Permanent structures shall be limited to those necessary to the growing and storage of such produce and permanent store or office buildings shall not be permitted, provided that the growing and storage of such produce may be conducted within the residence building of the owner or operator, located upon the property on which the nursery or greenhouse operations are being carried on.

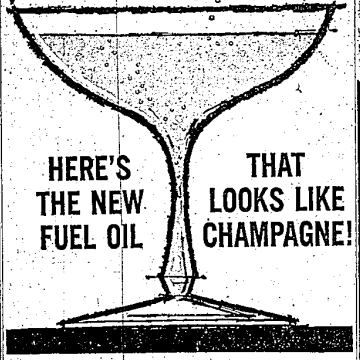

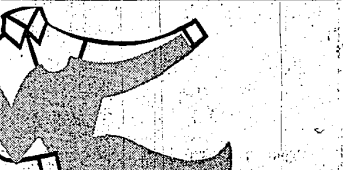
