Robinson scored his third touchdown of the night on a 25-yard burst off-backside early in the fourth quarter. Pat Godfrey put the topper on it with a 15-yard sweep of end in the closing minutes, and the final score read, Walled Lake 39, Farmington 6.

The Falcons were brutally outplayed. Walled Lake rolled up 227 yards on the ground and 87 in passing. Viking quarterback John Thomas hit for a total of 11 pass attempts, good for 97 yards and one touchdown.

MR. COLE SAID, "This new facility will help meet the increased need for additional outdoor opportunities for many future generations of boys. In addition to the fun experiences it will provide, use of the property should also teach many thousands of youngsters a respect for one of their most valuable heritages—our nation's great natural resources."
