Jessie Hudson, Plymouth High School art teacher, is the "Artist of the Month" at the Universalist-Unitarian Church of Farmington, which has several of her oil and watercolor displays in its Sunday School.

Mrs. Hudson, an Eastern Michigan University graduate, has been a resident of Farmington for 11 years and is president of the Three Cities Art Club. Her husband, Sam Hudson, is director of advertising and public relations for the Evans Product Co. of Farmington.

The artist, whose work is regularly exhibited at the Hart-Powers Gallery in Northville, is interested mainly in the various aspects of landscape and her work usually reflects some basis in the growing forceful nature. She works in oil, easel, acrylic and monotype, but is especially fond of watercolor for its spontaneity and sparkle.

5. In turn, pleasant homes make pleasant communities.

Field trips to local sites are valuable in reaching the goals of the total third grade social studies program in which "The Home, Community and Its Relation to Other Communities" is the main topic. Mrs. Joy said.
