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Y-Teens Plan To Fete School Administrators

With Dr. Samuel H. Brownell, Detroit superintendent of schools, heading the guest list, more than 500 school officials and Y-Teen advisers will be honored October 28 by the teen-age program committees of the YWCA of Metropolitan Detroit.

Among those invited to attend the dinner are Farmington school officials, Gerald Harrison, superintendent of Farmington schools; James Reed, assistant superintendent of Farmington schools; M. Van Ameyde, assistant superintendent; James Gidgen, principal of Farmington High; Harold Hambley, principal of North Farmington; Gerald Spink, principal of W. Farmington; and Charles Murray, principal of Farmington Jr. High.

THE EVENT WILL be the triennial dinner paying tribute to those school people whose cooperation and interest make possible the work of Y-Teen clubs in senior and junior high schools, Miss Dolores Potts, Y-Teen director, said.

Each Y-Teen club is organized in a senior or junior high school and has a teacher as an adult adviser, she explained. Membership in the clubs is open to all girls attending the school.

"Through activities which they themselves plan, the 3,500 Y-Teens of Metropolitan Detroit grow into healthier and happier adults," she said.

"TEEN-AGE CLUBS in the YWCA are noted for their interest in services to others," she pointed out. "Senior high clubs, for instance, raise funds to support overseas orphans, visit the aged, do recreational work with handicapped and retarded children."

Girls in junior high Y-Teen clubs usher at school plays, make trays for stuffed animals for hospital patients. And girls from all the clubs pick kids for the Torch Fund Drive."

Speaker at the 6 p.m. dinner October 28 at the Downtown Branch YWCA will be Dr. Earl H. Ferguson, professor at Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D.C.

Beechview PTA Meeting Held

The Beechview PTA held its initial meeting on October 14 at 8 p.m., and was well attended by some 100 interested parents. The evening was presided over by the Power Reactor Development Company addressed the group on the Enrico Fermi Atomic Power Plant, located 30 miles southwest of Detroit at Lagoona Beach.

The power plant, the largest of its kind anywhere in the world, is owned and operated jointly by the Detroit Edison Company and the Power Reactor Development Company, and is supported by the Atomic Power Development Associates. The latter is a group of many industries interested in the development of atomic power into a commercially practicable means of generating electric power. In addition, the Atomic Energy Commission also lends its assistance in the form of services.

MR. ARNOLD developed the story of Enrico-Fermi, which uses nuclear fission in the turbine as a heat source. The operation of the plant was detailed, including the unique breeder-reactor, in which uranium is burned as fuel and plutonium produced as a result. The audience found the story fascinating, and were interested as well as surprised to learn that such an enormous and important atomic power plant is located so nearby. Mr. Arnold stressed that visitors are welcome at the information center on the grounds, where working models of the plant may be seen Tuesdays through Saturdays, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Following Mr. Arnold's lecture Mr. Clifford, Mr. Neal, and Mr. Oliver of the school board presented the PTA with an explanation of the bond and millage issue to be voted November 13. Three questions will be on the ballot: one, can the Farmington schools borrow 9 mills to build the 138 classrooms needed by 1967 (no increase in taxes); two, shall the 2 mill levy that expires in 1964 be renewed (no increase in taxes as such an extension of the present taxes voted in November 1959); three, shall there be an increase of an additional 3 mills (\$3.00 per \$1,000 of assessed property value) to pay salaries for the 36 new teachers a year needed for the next four years to meet rising enrollments (the first increase in taxes asked since 1959). Board members made the issue very clear for the parents present, and answered questions from the audience upon completion of their explanation.

APPRECIATION was extended Mr. Clifford, Mr. Neal, and Mr. Oliver for their time, and the meeting was concluded with the presentation of a past president's lapel pin to Aldo Vagstad.

Human Relations Work Gains Local Support

The work of the Archbishops Committee on Human Relations, currently sponsoring a series of educational meetings in the field of race relations, has won support of the Farmington Universalist - Unitarian Church.

In a statement issued this week by its planning council, the church said the meetings "represent an important and major step toward performance of this educational need," and added:

"WE URGE THAT this be considered the first step in an educational program that must continue and reach further into the Detroit community."

The statement pointed out that the liberal church "has long expressed and supported a dedication to the equality of all men, regardless of race, religion or national origin, and our church has sought to realize this goal in its history of more than 100 years in Farmington."

It added in part: "We believe the drive for equal rights of Negroes is an important concern for those of us who live in suburban communities. We recognize that many of our fellow suburban residents have deeply ingrained feelings and fears regarding

the impact of current movements in the area of race relations. We feel it is morally inescapable that significant and early changes must be made to acquire full human rights for Negroes, but that great care must be taken to avoid hatred and violence. We believe that such progress can best be made through a broad range of community-wide education program."
