Raiders Run Wild in Warmup For Arch-Rival Farmington

North Farmington moved under the out-state "Grand Rapids" Creston last Saturday as the Raiders chalked up 29 points to GR's 13.

The Raiders kicked off, but were soon in possession.

BOB "Benny" Huth, on the first offensive play, for NP, scampered forty-seven yards to the "Polar Bear" yard line.

Then glanced off left tackle for the "T.D." The conversion was missed and NP had a 6-0 lead.

"Only eight minutes later fullback Keith Hiltz dove over from the six-inch line.

With the extra point made good the Raiders were up 13-0 after a forty-yard pass and the seven-minute mark in the half.

The Polar Bears struck back on two long passes that set up a two-yard scoring plunge. The extra point was good, and they had the Raider lead to 13-7.

LEE MARITILLA took to the air, and flanker Bill Hall ran under a forty-yard pass and sprinted the final thirteen yards to paydirt. "Ace" kicked the extra point to make the score at the half, 20-7.

North Farmington dominated play in the second half as midway through the third stanza Maritilla, on a quarterback sneak, went two yards for another score. The point after touchdown was blocked and the Raiders owned a 26-7 lead.

Coach Ron Holland went with the reserves and they took the ball down to the Creston fifteen-yard line where their drive was stalled. This set the stage for NP's last points of the contest.

JIM ACITELLI, ready to attempt a thirty-yard field goal, was penalized five yards for kicking too much time. Now a thirty-five-yard field goal, the score simply put his educated leg to the puskinn and three more points went up on the scoreboard.

Creston's final score came on the last play of the game as they passed fifteen yards to their right end. The extra point was too good and the game ended NP 29, Polar Bears 13.

THE RAIDERS play South Farmington tomorrow, November 1. Both the Raiders and Bears want this one, which should come out to be quite a battle. Game time is 3:30 on the Falcons' field.

From here on it was all Farmington. Tackling sharply and running effectively the Rockets won 13-0 in all statistics.
