Mr. Christian G. Lehmann passed away at his residence, 3215 Farmington Road, on Thursday evening, October 23, 1953 following an extended illness. He was 88 years old.

Mr. Lehmann was born in Germany on March 25, 1865, the son of Carl and Sophia Hermann Lehmann. On November 22, 1913, he was united in marriage to Stella Duran in Detroit.

MR. LEHMANN had been a resident in the city of Farmington for the past thirty-seven years.

He had been a professional waiter for the past fifty years, during part of that time he was with Northwood Inn, Huckle Inn and at the time of his retirement he was employed at the Berkeley Club. Mr. Lehmann was a member of Local 705 Hotel and Restaurant Employees Union.

Funeral services took place on Monday at 11 a.m. from the Thayer Funeral Home with Rev. Carl H. Schultz of the Salem United Church of Christ officiating. Interment was in Glen Eden Memorial Cemetery.
