Farmington Falconaires Are School Music Makers

The Falconaires are not the Farmington Senior High School volleyball team. Nor are they a new '64 model Ford. The Falconaires are Farmington Senior High School's variety vocalists. Music is what they make.

Mr. Warren Henderson organized the first Falconaires (originally spelled Falconairs) in November, 1948. They were a group of zealous musicians who had the desire to get more out of their high school music course than was offered in the

group was selected by try outs. The first Falconaires made their public debut on Thanksgiving morning, 1948. They were part of a holiday program given by radio station WOLR in Royal Oak. That radio performance and the others that followed it were largely due to the efforts of Mr. Lloyd Smith, staunch supporter of the group.

In 1953 the Falconaires sang at the Teachers' Institute for Region 7 held at the Masonic Temple. Their biggest triumph came, however, in 1952 when they were invited by the state Kiwanis Club to sing for the Inter-urban Kiwanis Convention in Dallas, Texas. Sending the group there became a community project. Funds were donated by local organizations, interested individuals, and even by the State of Michigan.

The main projects of the Falconaires today include singing, when possible, for local civic groups, community events, and all Farmington Senior High music programs.

The 1953-1954 Falconaire girls are Susan Edwards, Sherry Hamann, Vivienne McHenry, Janet King, Marge Dowling, Miriam Gordon, Barbara Berling, and Betty Grieling. There are no returning Falconaires in this year's group.

Fred M. Warner State Governor Three Terms



FRED M. WARNER

One of Farmington's most prominent and noted citizens in its long history was Fred M. Warner.

His success in state politics in the early 1900's really put Farmington on the map.

It was in 1900 that Fred Warner was nominated as a Republican candidate for the office of Michigan Secretary of State and was elected later in that same year to go on to serve for two terms.

At the GOP State Convention in Detroit on June 30, 1904, Warner was nominated unanimously as the party's candidate for governor and was elected to this highest state office on Nov. 2 of that same year.

WARNER served the state well in his first two-year term and was re-elected again in 1906 and 1908 to become the first governor of Michigan to serve for three consecutive terms.

Another distinction which was his was that he was the youngest secretary of state to have ever been elected and also the state's youngest governor.

He was elected to the office of the adoption of the state constitution in 1909.

IBM Schedule Goof Creates New Study Hall

Farmington Senior High has a new type of study hall this year—quite by accident.

When the class schedules were made by I.B.M., 125 students were assigned to a room which has a seating capacity of 100. These extra 25 students were sent to Room 106-D, an unused classroom.

In this room they do their studying, and conduct themselves in an adult manner without the supervision of a teacher. Their only supervisor is senior Fred Burton who sits at the head of the room and takes attendance.

When some members of this "unusual" study hall were asked what they thought of it, they all agreed that they liked the arrangement, and could not recommend any changes other than giving less authority to the student at the head of the room, who, they say, abuses his authority by threatening to spank the girls.

WARNER helped found and was president of the Farmington State Savings Bank. He was also vice president of the Detroit United Bank and had an interest in a number of other banks and financial institutions in Eastern Michigan.

WARNER first entered state politics in 1885 when he was elected to the state senate. He served two terms as the youngest senator in the state.

Fred Warner died in Oakland, Florida on April 17, 1923. He had gone there the previous fall for his health. His body was returned to Farmington where he was laid to rest in Oakwood Cemetery.

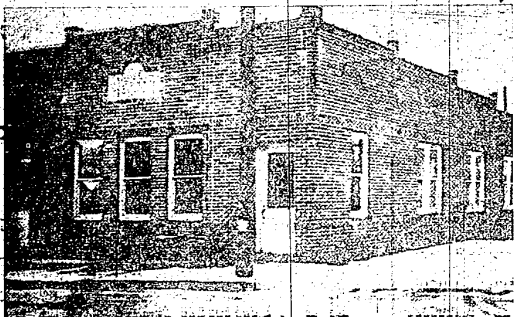

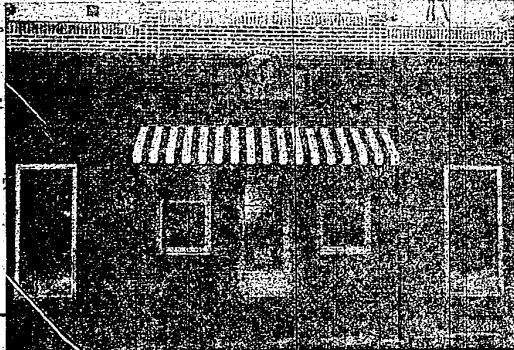

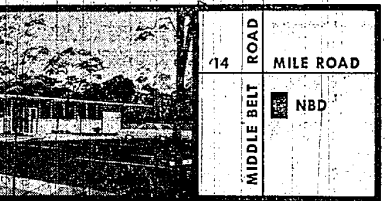
