Capt. John T. Buck of Farmington Named to Air Force Delegation

Captain John T. Buck of Farmington was appointed by the U.S. Air Force to the Tactical Air Command at the Air Force Academy in Denver, Colorado on September 20.

He is a jet fighter pilot presently assigned to the 366th Tactical Fighter Squadron stationed at Homestead AFB, Florida.

At the Air Force Academy, Captain Buck outlined for the cadets the career opportunities within his branch of the service. He was one of four fighter pilots selected from the U.S. Air Force to represent a portion of the counseling program.

A 1949 GRADUATE of Farmington High School where he was a member of the Student Council and earned letters in both football and track, Captain Buck accepted a commission in the Air Force in the fall of 1952 after completing the ROTC program at the University of Michigan.

He completed pilot training in 1952, in the day one-quarter of his class and was selected to attend the Jet Fighter School located at Williams AFB in Arizona and continued at Nellis AFB in Nevada.

He was assigned to George AFB in California after fighter pilot training and accepted a Regular Officer commission in 1953.

Captain Buck is also a graduate of the U.S. Army's Airborne Paratrooper School and wears the wings of that corps in addition to his pilot's wings. He is fully qualified to direct Army Airborne units and control air strikes by fighters on ground and air targets. He has had under his command during combat maneuvers up to 200 men.

He has COMPLETED 2,240 hours of flying time of which 1,750 hours were in single seat, single engine jet fighters.

Captain Buck has had Air Force exchange pilot duty with the U.S. Marine Corps during which time he became one of the few regular Air Force officers to qualify to operate fighter planes from Navy aircraft carriers.

During the recent Cuban crisis, Captain Buck was assigned to the crack 31st Tactical Fighter Wing stationed at Homestead AFB. He is a flight leader qualified to lead any number of aircraft on any assigned mission anywhere in the world.

Captain Buck's gunnery records indicate he is able to maintain weapons delivery scores of the highest precision.
