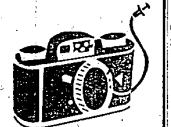
THIS MARKS the first time the G.M. Choir has appeared in the Farmington area.

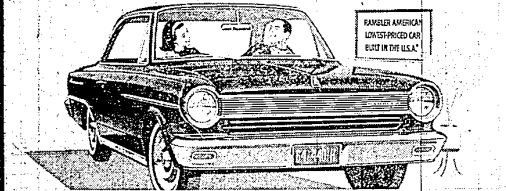

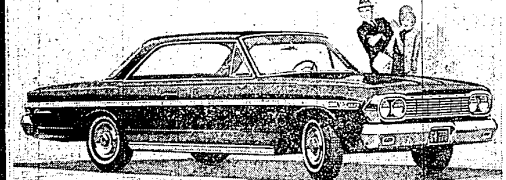

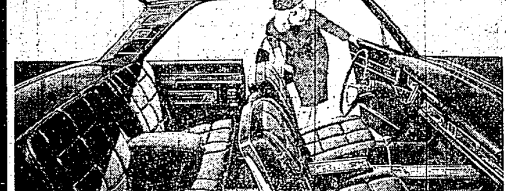
