

Community College Citizens Committee Plans Next Meeting

Members of the Community College Citizens Committee were assigned to study the law and to analyze a 1961 study of a Community College Citizens Advisory Committee in preparation for their next meeting. Thirty people, representing 20 or 30 school districts in the County, were present at the last meeting in the Oakland Schools office.

At the next meeting at 8 p.m., Wednesday, December 4, three lawyers will report on the legal aspects of establishing a two-year college in the County. The task of studying statutes went to Burton R. Shifman of Oak Park, George R. Mosher of Birmingham, and Bill Hollingshead, also of Birmingham.

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Chairman Wendell Brown of Farmington said the Committee has been charged with the responsibility for recommending to the Oakland County Board of Education how the Community College proposition shall be presented at the next election.

"If the law offers alternatives to placing all three questions on the ballot on the basis that if one fails, all fail," said Brown, "we will have to choose the one we feel is the most acceptable to the voters."

Chairman of five campaign sub-committees were named. C. Ray Ballard of Huntington Woods will lead the effort to have organizations throughout the county send a representative to the Community College Citizens Committee meetings and serve as an information source about the college to his own group.

Headling the finance committee is Eugene W. Kuthy of Royal Oak. Mrs. John May of Birmingham is chairman of the speakers bureau. Two school district liaison committee chairmen were named. Burton R. Shifman of Oak Park will coordinate efforts of school groups in the southern portion of the county. William K. Martin of Oxford will work with school organizations in the north county districts.

Mrs. Arthur Carithers of Rochester is chairman of a public information committee.

The college committee adopted a resolution asking both daily and weekly newspapers in the county to send representatives to meetings so that the voters can be fully informed on the college issue by the June 8 election date.

Employed by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, he holds the position of military communications representative.

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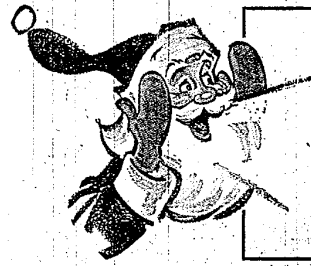
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
