The Our Lady of Sorrows Oakland County and the State High School wrestling team will begin its 1963-1964 season with a full schedule of 23 dual meets in the State Wrestling engagements next Tuesday evening, December 3, at the OLS gym when they play host in a dual meet to the matmen of Grosse Ile.

Coach Dan W. Potter has 15 returning lettermen from his squad of last year which topped record after record in winning 11 dual meets, eight trophies against just one defeat.

STAN SECOSKY, a 138-pound senior, was last year's State Champion in his weight division. In all last season, coach Potter's matmen earned 12 individual tournament championships and won a total of 27 individual tournament places.

## Grunt 'n Groan Light Brigade Is Best at FHS

With the 1963-64 wrestling season coming up fast, it looks as though the lighter weight classes will be applied filled because the heavier ranges open. This is due to the lack of participation from the bigger weight classes at FHS. Openings are still available to interested students, especially sophomores whose numbers ranked lowest among the 25 grapplers now on the squad.

Mr. Bill Gucciardo, Falcon coach, said that one of the primary reasons for this lack of participation is because of the low interest in wrestling at FHS. "This is because nobody understands our sport," said Gucciardo.

"You can't enjoy a wrestling match from these once-a-season assemblies," commented Coach Gucciardo during the Winter Sports Assembly, November 15. He later went on to say that almost any spectator who came to one match could easily pick out the "kill of being a spectator" by watching the twelve individual matches that constitute a dual meet.

Another misunderstanding "draw-back" is weight loss. A new rule will make it easier on the wrestlers this season. In general, the "flex script" states that a participant will be allowed to vary his weight at various points through out the season. The previous rule was that a wrestler had to remain within a four-pound range after his first official match for the remaining stretch of the season.

"If a student wishes to come out for wrestling and lose weight, he will be surprised to find that ten pounds can be lost with complete stability of previous health," stated Coach Gucciardo. "If you come out and practice with the team, you'll lose ten pounds" said Gucciardo.

"It was also pointed out that the loser of these excess pounds will always gain these 10 and 15 more because of workouts and body-building exercises during the wrestling program.

Along with the recruiting efforts of the Falcon wrestling, a drive has been launched to interest parents in FHS wrestling. This campaign will include printed programs and a planned "Parent's Day" later in the season.
