Realtors in 11 metropolitan communities including Farmington, have agreed to close their offices and discontinue holding open houses on Sunday, December 7, 1963, in observance of the day of the week.

The voluntary closing agreement, which more than 120 realtor offices in the western portions of Detroit and Wayne and Oakland counties have subscribed, became effective Sunday, December 1.

"OUR DECISION to eliminate Sunday open houses has been made in response to public demand," Funk explained. "Many of our customers objected to the inconvenience of having to remain at home on Sunday and also to having family gatherings interrupted by strangers wishing to view their home."

Henceforth, insofar as possible, open houses will be held on Saturdays, Funk stated. This has proved to be a more convenient day, for prospective buyers and home buyers alike.

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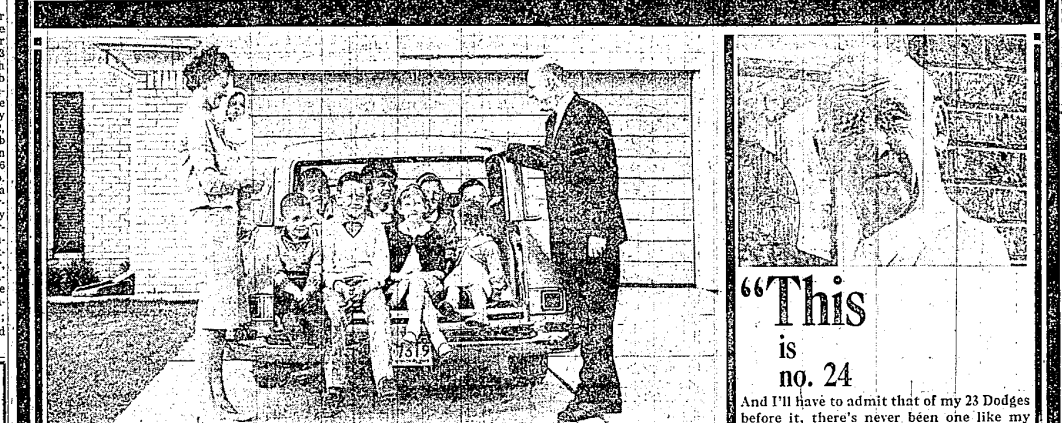
