A Special Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was called to order November 30, A.D. 1963 at 10:05 a.m. by Mr. Curt Hall, Chairman. Members present were Hall, Bessette, Williams, Reslow, and O'Leif. Also present was the Township Attorney, Brennan. Absent: Duke.

Minutes of Last Meeting, November 22, 1963, were approved as published.

Minutes of Special Meeting, November 4, 1963, stand approved as published.

MOTION by Avery supported by Bessette that the Township Board authorize the Supervisor and Clerk to enter into a contract with the Farmington Masonic Lodge for the sale of the Old Township Hall located at 2315 Farmington Road to the Masonic Lodge at the appraised value, such sale will be contingent upon the approval of the contract by the Township Attorney. Roll call vote, 6 Yeas, 0 Nays, carried unanimously.

MOTION by Bessette supported by Walter the Zoning Ordinance be amended as recommended by the Zoning Board, amending Article IV, V, VI and XIV; and become effective thirty days after first publication. Roll call vote, 6 Yeas, 0 Nays, carried unanimously. Published December 5, 1963.

LEGAL NOTICE

SCHOOL BUS ORDINANCE VILLAGE OF QUAKERTOWN

Ordinance to protect the public safety by prohibiting vehicles from overtaking or passing any school bus which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers within the Village of Quakertown and to provide for penalties for the violation thereof.

THE VILLAGE OF QUAKERTOWN ORDAINS:

1. The driver of a vehicle shall not overtake or pass any school bus which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers within the Village of Quakertown. All school buses shall contain such signs on the back and front thereof, with respect thereto, as shall be approved by the State Highway Commissioner.

2. The driver of a vehicle overtaking or passing any school bus shall not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or the school bus driver signals to proceed or the visual signals are no longer visible to the driver of the school bus, before resuming motion, shall signal stopped traffic to proceed and shall when resuming motion, proceed in such a manner as to allow congested traffic to disburse by keeping the bus as near to the right side of the road as practicable, and shall not pass the school bus at a speed not greater than 5 miles an hour with due caution for the safety of passengers being received or discharged from such school bus.

3. No school bus driver shall receive or discharge passengers unless such bus is stopped in its proper position to approaching or overtaking drivers of vehicles for a distance of at least 500 feet.

4. The driver of the vehicle upon any highway which has been divided into two or more lanes by a physical barrier or clearly indicated dividing section, or constructed as to impede the vehicular traffic need not stop upon meeting a school bus which has stopped across the dividing space barrier or section.

5. Every school bus shall, in addition to any other equipment and distinctive markings required by law, be equipped with two flashing red lights, high and widely spaced laterally as practicable which shall be capable of displaying, in front, two alternately flashing red lights located at the same level and in a distance of at least 500 feet in normal sunlight and shall be actuated by the driver of said school bus whenever but only whenever such vehicle is stopped or is about to stop for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children.

6. Every school bus shall be equipped with a mirror, convex in shape, at least 7 1/2 inches in diameter, firmly mounted at the top of the fender in front of the bus. It shall be located on either the left or right side of the bus in such a manner that the seated driver may observe through its use, the road from the front bumper forward to the point where direct observation is possible.

7. Appropriate signs informing the public of the existence of regulation shall be posted at the corporate limit of the Village on Farmington Road.

8. Violation of this Ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor which shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail for not to exceed 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

9. This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days after publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.
