Path Provided, Kids to Walk

A walking pathway from the end of Wildwood Trail in Woodbine Subdivision to the Middlebelt School grounds has now been completed and children from the subdivision presently being built and school will be walking there very soon now.

This was the report made to the Board of Education Monday night by Supt. G. V. Harrison. Because of the hazardous conditions for walking which prevail along Ten Mile bus service had been granted for the children living in this subdivision by the Board earlier, even though the youngsters were within a mile's walking distance from the school.

At the time the special bus service was granted it was established that it would only be allowed until such time as property could be obtained to provide a walking route from the subdivision to the school property.

Children from the Woodbine Subdivision area are presently being bused to the Middlebelt School because of hazardous walking conditions for them along Ten Mile Road.

The new City Hall building, new banks and bank branches, shopping centers and post office building in the community also came in for commendation.

THE ONE QUESTION which naturally would be expected to play a heavy part in any decision by industry to locate here, "How are taxes?" actually proved to be secondary to many other of the factors considered.

In answer to the tax question, Rapinard - Keystone officials revealed they were swayed by the fact this community is predominantly residential in character with well-defined areas for industrial development. It was and is their opinion that taxes should be a good chance of becoming spread out over a more balanced tax base in the future with the coming of more industry. Taxes would, in other words, not go as high but stood a good chance of being reduced with future development.

Among the new plant's more than 32 full time employees, many are presently living in and around the community. Good transportation and the geographic location factors were important for them. But all of the other factors which helped bring the new industry to Farmington will like-wise be important for the employees should any of them decide to make their homes here.

Boy Will Get Ride to School

By a vote of 4-3, the Farmington Board of Education decided Monday night to grant bus transportation to the junior high school age son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry S. Gavlin of 27260 Lakeside Avenue. The boy, slightly less than a mile and a half walking distance from Dunkel Junior High.

The opinion of the school safety committee was that requiring this boy to walk across Orchard Lake south of the I-696 expressway and then across the entrance and exit drives to the expressway on the west side was not overly hazardous but four members of the seven-member Board did not agree.

Those voting against providing transportation to the boy were President Leland Clifford, Secretary Barbara Brown and Trustee Vernon Fisher. Mrs. Brown and Fisher are both members of the special school safety investigating committee.

road officials had for affording greater safety was for the Township and School District along with residents to provide suitable walkways along the road's right-of-ways, a spokesman for the safety committee said.

It was pointed out that this might be possible along the east side of Middlebelt from the Franklin Triller Court to Ten Mile and thence onward on school property north of Ten Mile. The school administration was interested in the Board to see what help could be obtained from the Township in getting necessary easements between Nine and Ten Mile.

On the west side of Middlebelt from Kimberley Subdivision southward down to the school property, however, it was not felt that this would be possible since there is not enough room between the ditch and property lines.

A SPECIAL meeting with officials of the Kimberley safety committee has been scheduled for tonight, Thursday, Dec. 12, at 8 p.m. at East Junior High to discuss the matter in detail. Byron Oliver, a school official on the safety committee, said.

During the lengthy discussion which was held on this matter Monday night, it was pointed out that county road officials had at least agreed to provide curbs where needed if easements could be obtained and walkways developed.

The Board explained to the citizens the school's practice of trying to locate schools as close to the center of square mile sections as possible so as to best serve the families with children in that section. AT THE PUBLIC hearing on this request, five or six homeowners from Valleyview Subdivision appeared to object along with a couple of homeowners from Lakeside Avenue. Their contention was that such development would devalue their property substantially.

The planners indicated that they plan to look this proposed area over carefully and will likely make their recommendations at their next regular meeting on January 13.

The newest request for rezoning for apartments has been made by Ralph Banfield and John Clappison. They are asking for a change in the zoning on an approximately two-acre parcel at the southeast corner of Grand River and Gill Road where they propose 28 to 30 deluxe apartment units.

A public hearing on this rezoning request has been set for the January 13 Planning Commission meeting.

Hear Objection To School Site

Negotiations are now being conducted by Farmington School officials for a new elementary school site in Section 16 in the northwest corner of Farmington Township.

A somewhat surprising development resulted Monday night when a group of homeowners from Franklin Fairway in the section appeared to voice objections to the Board's acquisition of a site anywhere near their street.

Their contention was that a school near their homes would devalue their property values substantially. Also of concern to them was the fact that Franklin Fairway might be made a thru-street to the school property.
