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Deaf Children Getting Help In Oakland County Schools

"We can almost say the profoundly deaf child no longer exists," said Mrs. Lucille Kirchhoff, beginning her new job recently as Oakland County consultant supervisor for the education of deaf children.

Mrs. Kirchhoff explained that during World War II the U.S. Navy developed earphones that amplify sound so that vibrations can be sensed by people who have never heard sound before.

"WHEN WE FIND a child who registers no hearing in medical tests, we put earphones on him anyway," she said. "He can begin to pick up such gross sounds as bells, and whistles. In time, with the help of other methods he may learn to recognize speech patterns."

A member of Oakland County special education staff, Mrs. Kirchhoff will work with the teachers of the 88 deaf and hard-of-hearing children in Oakland County.

"Prescription integration" is Mrs. Kirchhoff's term for the methods of getting the deaf child back to the company of hearing children as soon as possible.

"WHEN A DEAF child is able to compete with other children in math, he is sent to the arithmetic class," she said. "Of course he must have the understanding of the regular class-
