Slate Sermon On Slum Living

Experiences gained while living and working in a metropolitan slum area will be described at the 10 a.m. services Sunday, Jan. 25, at the Universalist-Unitarian Church of Farmington by minister Robert M. Edgely.

"White, Like Me" will be the second of two sermons Mr. Edgely has based on reporting work in Philadelphia last summer directing a group of college students who found work and lived cooperatively in the city's slum area.

THE PROJECT was sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee.

Just week the local minister outlined some of the causes that have produced a "society of failure" at the core of our great cities, technological disruption of the relationship between consumer and size of work force, the unfulfilling stimulation of wants, the demoralizing influence of a materialistic society rooted in slavery and perpetuated by ADC and the emasculated image of the Negro male.

Sunday Mr. Edgely will examine some of the positive values that have managed to survive and grow in slum environment, and suggest ways in which church members of the "affluent society" might help this part of the population make a true contribution to the nation's life.

Discussion groups, including one on education, will follow the service at 11 a.m. Church school classes run from 10 a.m. to noon.
